In the coming Oregon election the Republicans expect to roll up a handsome majority for their ticket of two Congressmen and State officers. Oregon is the first State to hold her election, which will be in June. On many previous occasions the Oregon election has encouraged and emboldened the Republican party of the country. The State is now safely Republican, although it went for fusion in 1892, and in 1890 as the result of the silver craze, McKinley had only two thousand plurality. The Republicans have this year put up a good ticket and stand upon a platform which comes out strongly in favor of the retention of the Philippines, attacks the trusts, advocates protection of domestic industries which need it, declares for Chinese exclusion and favors irrigation. The Democratic platform, on the other hand, demands the withdrawal of the United States troops from the Philippines. The country will watch with considerable interest as to how the two propositions are received by the people of the Pacific Coast commonwealth.

Green's Station Sold.

Lon R. Green, who has for many years conducted the accommodation station and inn at Clover Flat, has sold his interest there to A. W. Bryan, proprietor of the Lakeview-Paisley stage line. Under the new contract Mr. Bryan will have to carry the mails over the route through Crooked Creek valley, and his new purchase makes a convenient point for a way-station at the intersection of the mountain and valley roads. With the station proper Mr. Bryan gets about 500 acres of land, a portion of which is roadbed. The Post says that Mr. Green desires to move his family away from their present home to a climate that will be more healthful, and will probably locate in Fresno county, California. All who have ever traveled over the northern route, and whose good fortune it was to seek accommodation at Green's station, will remember the host and hostess as most agreeable and warm-hearted people. Mr. Bryan will continue to conduct the station as an accommodation to the traveling public, and all who have ever enjoyed the hospitality of he and the affable Mrs. Bryan will be glad that the place has fallen into such excellent hands. The suit of Mrs. Allie Van Buren against the Mountain Copper Company to recover \$20,000 damages for the death of her husband at the mine was given to the jury yesterday, which brought in a verdict for \$15,000. The real loser by the verdict is the Employer's Liability Insurance Corporation of England, which assumes all damages awarded employes of the Mountain Copper Company.—Miner.
