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**DEMOCRATIC DISCUSSIONS.**

And still the mooted question is "What political faith does B. Daly profess?" "On what platform does he stand?" is what a good many voters would like to know. Surely not on any platform built in the late one-man Democratic County Convention—for there was none built. Daly is the author of the "political principles" enunciated at the late local convention. There were a good many "resolutions" adopted in that evening, but nothing about the main party issues—there was no platform endorsed, and B. Daly has studiously avoided any mention of platform, or how he stands on the political issues of the country. He did take occasion recently, when cornered by that prominent stockman of Silver Lake, J. W. Howard, to make the statement that if he had been elected to Congress he should have voted against his party on the Silver issue. The conversation took place in the Hotel Lakeview, and B. Daly will not deny the statement, though he may endeavor to avoid it by craftiness. It is "none of our pie," but we have heard Democrats discuss Daly's political principles, and "wonder how he stands" politically—whether he is for Gold or Silver, or what not. He is a political enigma. B. Daly will probably not deny any of the following statements:

In 1896 when he ran for State Senator from this district B. Daly told George Small of Silver Lake that he was in favor of the Free and Unlimited Coinage of Silver at the ratio of 16 to 1. He also wrote to Steve Gaylord of Paisley, in answer to an inquiry as to his position on the Money Question, that he was a staunch advocate of Free Silver.

W. A. Wilshire, who was a delegate to the Democratic State Convention held at Portland in 1896, assured J. W. Howard, then a delegate to the same convention from Crook County, (and all the other delegates from Crook) that B. Daly was a strong advocate of the Gold Standard.

W. A. Bell, chairman of the Republican Central Committee of Crook County for eight years, and still chairman of that Committee, said in Lakeview a few weeks ago that Crook County Republicans elected Daly in 1896; they voted for him strongly because they understood and believed that Daly was a Gold Standard man, and that Capt. O. C. Applegate, his opponent in that campaign was a Free Silver man. Mr. Bell says that had the people of Crook County known during that campaign that Capt. Applegate was a Gold Standard man he would have defeated Daly, for it was Crook's vote that elected the latter.

Will B. Daly deny any of these statements publicly? The Examiner challenges him to do so. The people would like to have a statement from him as to what his real position was at that time and how he stands at this time. Will he make the statement? In 1896 scores of men voted for him, with the understanding that he was an advocate of the Gold Standard and many others gave him their votes believing him to be a Free Silver man. He certainly misled one side or the other by posing in a false position.

And this is the man who wants to be Judge of Lake county.

**SCUTTLE THE ISSUE.**

The drift of sentiment in the Democratic party seems to be in favor of making an issue with the Republicans on the question of the disposition of the Philippines.

In adopting a policy on that issue, however, Democrats must be prepared to say that if the power is entrusted to them they will give up the Philippines, because they will be made to stand for the surrender of the islands when they refuse to accept the "civil government" policy outlined by the Republicans. It will not be sufficient for them to simply antagonize the Republican party. They must have a policy of their own and it must be something tangible—Mobile Register.

The Democrats of Oregon have outlined a policy that is plain and simple scuttle, and while the Democratic candidate for governor won't stand for it, yet it is the deliberate expression of the party after a day given to the perplexing question. Scuttle won't work in Oregon, and the people will repudiate the idea of such a thing by an enormous vote on June 23, says the Oregon Statesman.
