ORDER TO APPEAR AND SHOW CAUSE.

IN THE CIRCUIT COURT OF THE STATE OF OREGON, for the County of Lake. THE STATE OF OREGON, Plaintiff vs. O. E. Charlton, as Administrator of the Estate of Benjamin Warner, Defendant.

IT APPEARING TO THE COURT THAT the state of Oregon, as Plaintiff, by A. E. Reames, District Attorney for the First Judicial District of Oregon, and L. F.
