SAYS THE REPORT IS UNTRUE.

John R. McCormack, late principal of the Lakeview public school, arrived in Lakeview Monday evening, on the Southern stage and was met here by his brother Will McCormack. They left for Paisley early Tuesday morning. Mr. McCormack called on The Examiner and stated that the public rumor circulated about Lakeview and published in The Examiner last week to the effect that he had obtained a divorce and had been married again was untrue. He said that as soon as the report reached his ears he hurried back to Lake county to contradict it. He requested that The Examiner correct the statement that he had been divorced and married again, and upon his statement the publishers of this paper believe that the same is untrue. It is regrettable that such a report was made public, not only on account of the family of Mr. McCormack, but also on account of the lady whose name was connected with the case. The Examiner did not give publicity to the matter through any spirit of maliciousness, but to be sensational, as some of the enemies of this paper—whom the publishers look upon with extreme contempt and disdain—would have the parties directly interested, and the public generally, believe. The matter was taken up by The Examiner as a matter of news, and published solely in that line. The Examiner has been asked, in a courteous and respectful manner by Mr. McCormack, to state that the report of his "divorce and marriage" was untrue. As a matter of fairness we do so.

It may also ease the minds of a coterie of contemptible whelps in Lakeview, who are well known to the publishers of this paper, to understand that we do not fear the results of a libel suit, nor a personal encounter over this affair. We may also later on have occasion to give to the public the names of the skulaguys who have said that "it would be a good time to send the editor of The Examiner to the penitentiary and drive The Examiner to the wall."

We smile at the silly efforts of these fellows to injure this paper.

It appears now that none of the base ball enthusiasts of the country wanted any of the \$500 put up by Lakeview for a tournament contest during the first week in July. June 10th was the date when the entries were to close, and as no team entered the tournament was declared off. It seems that persistent "knocking" against Lakeview by "sore-head" enthusiasts in adjoining counties did the business. It was falsely and maliciously reported that Lakeview had a full team of professionals here already in practice to go in and get the money. There was no such intention, and no outside ball player has been here this season.

The first actual move in the direction of establishing cable communication from San Francisco to Honolulu and Manila was made June 13th, when the Commercial Pacific Cable Company asked the supervisors of San Francisco permission to use the streets of the city for a conduit from the proposed landing at the end of Fulton street and the company's office. The cable will be ready for operation in five months.

The latest regarding the escaped convicts who murdered three guards at the penitentiary at Salem is to the effect that the officers have given up the chase. Tracy and Merrill, the escapes, are supposed to be in the mountains. All trace of them has been lost.

It is probable that Governor Geer will call an extra session of the Oregon legislature, though there is much opposition to the movement.
