THIRD DAY, JULY 3.

First Race, 1-2 Mile Heats..... 150.00

Second 3-4 Mile dash..... 125.00

FOURTH DAY, JULY 5.

First Race, 1 1-8 Mile dash..... 200.00

Second Race—Distance to be named at Race Track on afternoon, July 3d 150.00

All of the above races are free for all, except saddle race, which is for Lake county horses.
