The arrival of an automobile in Red Bluff causes the News of that city to remark that the "automobile has come to stay." How slow these small railroad cities are. Why, Lakeview was full of autos last winter.

The Fort Hall Indian Reservation, near Pocatello, Idaho, was thrown open for settlement by the Government on June 17th. Several thousand miners and home seekers were on hand at Pocatello to make the run. Dozens of men were after the same locations, and trouble was feared.

Just because Pelee erupted and destroyed a city and its people is no reason why Shasta, Lassen, Crater Lake and a bunch of other mountains should become boisterous. The report that the Northern California and Southern Oregon cones are about to admit their flows of lava has been discredited.

On June 16th the bill to pension the Indian War veterans of the Fifties was passed by the House, having previously been passed in the Senate. This is a long pending matter and it is the cause of general rejoicing that the survivors of the Indian Wars of 1855-56 are to receive the reward for hard service.

The publishers of the semi-weekly New Era at Alturas have discovered that publishing a twice-a-week paper in a small town like Alturas is not a paying proposition, and will go back to the once-a-week edition. The New Era semi-weekly was a credit to the publishers, Shook & Lighty, during its life, and the public may expect a much better publication than ever as a weekly.

Despite the gallant fight by the Pacific Coast Senators and Representatives, the Nicaragua Canal bill was defeated in the Senate in favor of the Spooner substitute for the Panama route. After two amendments to the Panama measure had been made, one providing for a commission to supervise the construction of the canal, and the other providing for the issuance of \$100,000,000 of 2 per cent gold bonds to raise the money with which to construct the waterway, it was passed by a vote of 47 to 6.

It was evident for several days before the vote was taken that the Spooner substitute, which in brief provides that the President shall select the Panama route if he can obtain a clear title to the Panama Canal Company's property, and otherwise he shall adopt the Nicaragua route, would command the votes of the majority of the Senate.

The Panama route was considered more desirable by the Senate than the Nicaragua route. The only question left open is the title to the property, and that the President will determine, if the House should adopt the Senate's amendments to its bill.

Senator Mitchell voted against the Spooner amendment.

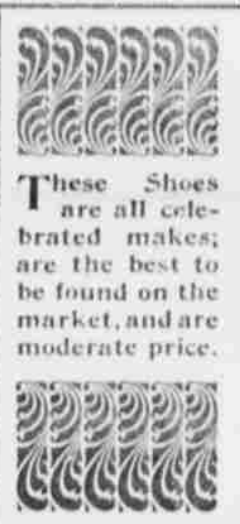
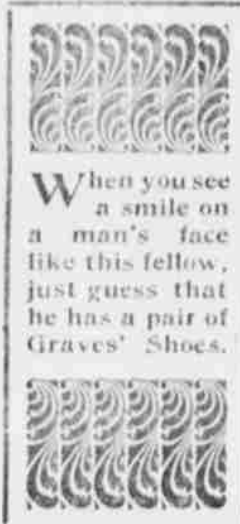
