In another column today will be found a letter to the editor. One would infer after reading the article that the man's refined feelings had been hurt by a directorship of a public school district, the motive for the insult being a lack of common regard for the ideas of one who believes in the public school system and whose intellect is so far above the intellect of the directorship referred to as to show a pretty calibre on the part of the latter. The Examiner knows nothing of the matter personally, but reading between the lines we find a subject for discussion.

Because Mr. Carnegie is many times a millionaire and accumulated his wealth through natural gifts of intellect and what education the public school system afforded him, to compete for success in the world's mart of trade—and because he found during a life-time that the greatest boon to mankind was the education which the laws of the country guarantee to its citizen children—it does not follow that the generous spirit the millionaire steel magnate displayed in the cause of common schools and free libraries is more to be praised than the magnanimous spirit of the man who counts his wealth in single dollars instead of millions. If The Examiner reads correctly this man's article, directorship of the local school affairs refused his splendid offer to establish in a small way a school library for the edification of the children of his district. God's best gift to humanity is an intellect that can be trained to higher things and purposes. The Examiner may be pardoned when it asserts that it is to be regretted that the Almighty in bestowing his gifts to nature was not as generous to a certain school directorship as he was to others. We boldly and flatly accuse the Almighty of barefaced discrimination. Mr. Carnegie, while bestowing his princely gifts of millions for free libraries in cities and towns of this nation was besieged by school directorships from thousands of localities for a free library donation. Mr. Carnegie not allowed to select the sites for the monuments to be erected in his memory—demands were made of him on every hand.

The local citizen who wishes to give his mite toward the betterment of the growing generation, as well as to the generation to come, and is not allowed to, should not attempt to "cast pearls before swine."

Still, the directorship may have its own good reason for not accepting this worthy gift. Education to some is not a good thing—while there is work to do on the farm. Some men can grow to manhood and pass through life without a thought of nature, the higher plane, the satisfaction that a trained mind gives to the heart and soul of man, and the beauty and refinement that surrounds the educated man's home—yes, he can go on and on to eternity without knowing that life is worth living. He has not lived at all—only existed.

The public school library should be compulsory.

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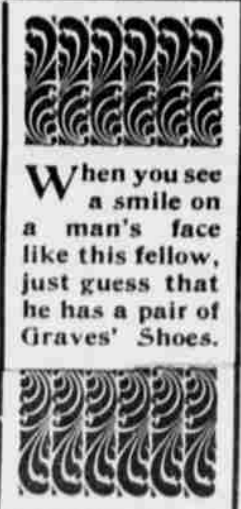
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
