New Jersey was probably the first state to make radical progress in road building. By her state aid law, passed in 1891, it was possible for the authorities, under the direction and petition of the taxpayers, to spend \$450,000 a year in road improvement. Under this beneficent law ten miles of excellent roads were built the following year, double that in the next year, and since 1895 the full limit of the amount allowed by law has been annually used. Allowing \$3,000 per mile, this means about 150 miles of roadbuilding every year.




