client to complete the necessary work already begun by the supervisor of said district. It is hereby ordered that a warrant be drawn upon the Treasurer in favor of J. D. McCrury as follows, to wit:

J. D. McCrury, appropriation road dist. No. 10, road fund..... \$112 50

It satisfactorily appearing to the court that the sealed bid filed by J. Willard Converse to furnish wood for Lake County as follows: Ten cords of 16-inch wood, and ten cords of 2-foot wood for the sum of \$1.75 per cord is a reasonable bid for said wood; It is therefore ordered that J. Willard Converse be and he is hereby awarded the contract to furnish 10 cords of 16-inch wood and 10 cords of 2 foot wood at \$1.75 per cord.

In the matter of the petition of H. A. Brattain and 39 others for the establishment of a county road:

This matter coming on regularly to be heard at this time for the second reading of the report of the viewers, and it appearing to the court that there are damage claims on file herein, and the court not being fully advised in the matter, It is hereby ordered that said matter be continued until the next regular term of the County Court.

It is hereby ordered that the bond of H. R. Dunlap as tax-collector of Lake county, Oregon, be and the same is hereby approved.

It is hereby ordered that all road supervisors of Lake County, Oregon, be and they are hereby required to execute a bond in the sum of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) for the faithful performance of their duty; and it is further ordered that the clerk of this court notify each and all of the road supervisors of said Lake county, Oregon, of the foregoing order.
