Largest Shipment Ever Made.

Coffin Bros., of Yakima county, Wash., have sold one batch of wool aggregating 210,000 pounds, to the botany Worsted Mills, of Passaic, New Jersey. The price received was ten cents per pound. Ten cars were needed to transport the clip to the mills. This is said to be the largest shipment ever made by one wool grower, at one time, in the Northwest. The wool was of the Merino and Cotswold classes, and would shrink about 65 per cent. It was baled in the hydraulic presses, putting three bags in one bale, and goes through to the mills at a special freight rate. The Botany Mills buyers have never operated in this country before, and the representatives claim they have made very large purchases in both Washington and Oregon.
