

## LOVE WAS THE CAUSE

**McDonald Shot Loux at Klamath Because the Latter Assisted a Rival Suitor.**

A man named J. L. Sullivan, known as "Happy Hooligan", who worked for McDonald, the slayer of Hoover and Loux, gives his view of the killing of Loux, after Hoover was killed. According to an interview in the Redding Free Press, Sullivan is of the opinion that the killing of Loux was premeditated. McDonald had for some time imagined that Loux "had it in for him" and wanted to get him out of the way. Loux was a close friend of a man named Williams, who was foreman in a factory near Klamath. Williams, according to Sullivan's story, was in love with a young lady in Klamath. McDonald was also in love with the same girl and jealous of the favors she showed Williams.

On one occasion Sullivan says that McDonald laid for Williams intending to do him great injury. He, McDonald, asked Sullivan to assist him. Sullivan says that McDonald believed Loux intended to take up Williams' fight and has ever since imagined that Loux would do him harm. For that reason he believes McDonald was prepared to kill Loux on the slightest provocation.

Sullivan has in his possession many letters from McDonald, by whom he was employed for a long time, written to him here. Sullivan seems of the opinion that McDonald is not mentally well balanced.
