GREAT RAILROAD PROJECT.

President James J. Hill, of the Great Northern Railway and the Northern Securities Company, is the latest transcontinental railroad influence to be connected with the Coos Bay Railroad, says the Oregonian. It is thought that Mr. Hill and Senator Clark can work on easy terms.

Mr. Hill has had agents in the Central Oregon field this summer, examining the country with considerable minuteness. One of his confidential engineers was in the territory between Shaniko and Lakeview and Klamath Falls early in the season. He went out in June and while awaiting a train wrote Mr. Hill a personal letter informing him of the situation of affairs in Central and Southern Oregon. About two weeks after, a Great Northern sleeping car came down from Spokane and was dropped off the O. R. & N. train at Biggs Junction and taken onto a Columbia Southern train for Shaniko. Thirty men who were in the car paid cash fare from Biggs to Shaniko, from which point they dispersed into the country to the southward, most of them taking teams for long drives. The Great Northern sleeping car was immediately returned to its home line. The men it delivered at Shaniko have not returned there, at least not in parties large enough to be noticed. Nothing definite has come to light as to their mission in the country.

Chief Engineer Kinney does not encourage the theory that President J. J. Hill is in any wise related to the Coos Bay railroad enterprise. "I am positive he has no connection with it whatever," said Mr. Kinney. After a moment's reflection he qualified this statement, saying:

"In these days it is a wise child, particularly a railroad child, that knows its own father. Perhaps I would better not say I know positively that Mr. Hill has no connection with our project, for I am not advised exactly who is the real power behind it all. But I may say that I have good reasons for the statement that Mr. Hill does not have anything to do with the Great Central Railroad. Personally I would be glad to see him in it, for I regard him as the grand old man of the Western railroad world, but I am satisfied he is not in it now."

Major Kinney says people are going to Coos Bay so fast that the hotel accommodations are already exceeded, and the first building to be constructed by the Great Central Land Company on the new townsite of Bangor will be a hotel. It will be patterned after the Hotel Portland, except that it will be only three stories in height. The second structure will be a general hospital, 40 x 300 feet, on the ground, and two stories tall. The general office building of cut stone will be started first, but many others will be completed before that one will be ready for use, which will be some time next Spring. Major Kinney says work at the quarry has already been begun in preparation for erecting the office building. The other structures, for which there is more pressing need, will be of wood.

There is no room for doubt about the great financial backing the Coos Bay-Salt Lake enterprise has for the building of the great cross-country route without delay.

Everything indicates the biggest State Fair in Oregon this year that the public has ever witnessed. It behooves Oregonians to patronize and say good words for our own fair. Others less interested will be indifferent about booming things. The State Fair belongs to all the people of the State. When the big thing comes off at Salem there should be no thought of locality. Eastern Oregon should show our people west of the Cascades that they are men and women who know no north, no south, no east, no west—we are, all one people for the great State Fair, however divided we might be on "geographical political lines." Let's all get in the big wagon and take our pumpkins and Hereford cattle to Salem. There are no "lobsters" on this side of the mountains. If you can't go to the State Fair at Salem tell your friends and neighbors to go, for it's going to be the biggest thing that ever happened this side the Lewis and Clark proposition in 1905. We

shouldn't wait three years to see something worth looking at. Great will be the Oregon State Fair!

The people who are to build the railroad from Coos Bay to Salt Lake are starting right. They are organizing an immigration department, before a mile of road is constructed, and they will at once begin the settlement and development of the country, so that the railroad will have business as soon as it is built. The construction of this line will mean tens and scores of thousands of new people in Southeastern and Southwestern Oregon, and vast commercial interests where little or nothing has been done or attempted before. New towns will spring up along the line, and established towns and cities will grow as their residents scarcely dreamed of. Out of the wilderness and the forest will spring well settled and prosperous communities.—Salem Statesman.
