**No Extension in Time.**

Under the new law for the collection of taxes, unpaid taxes become delinquent after the first Monday in October. The county courts have absolutely no jurisdiction in the premises, and do not have the right to extend for a day the time for the collection of any delinquent taxes. Under the old law regulating the collection of taxes they became delinquent after April 1, but the county court had the authority to make such extension of the time in which to make the collections as was deemed proper. But the county court has no power to act in this relation under the new law, and taxes will become delinquent after the first Monday in October.
