

COUNTY COURT

Lakeview, Or. Sept. 3, 1902.

A regular session of the County Court of Lake County, convened at the court house, Sept. 3rd, 1902. County Judge Daly and Commissioners S. J. Prose and W. A. Currier being present when the following proceedings were had.

It is hereby ordered that on and after this date it is the intention of this court to recognize no claim or charge against the county, except created by law, unless the same has been first authorized by the court.

Requisitions for supplies shall be submitted to the court and purchases made only upon the authority and under the direction of the court. The following claims were allowed:

Lakeview Or. Sept. 6 1902.

Court convened pursuant to adjournment, same officers present, when the following proceedings were had:

Whereas: the appropriation made by the twenty-first regular session of the legislative assembly of the State of Oregon, providing for the payment of two-thirds of the amount of bounties paid for coyote and other scalps as provided for by the provision of said act, has been exhausted, and that further legislation shall be necessary before any money will be available to pay such bounties, and in case the next legislature should fail to make an appropriation for the payment of two-thirds of the amount of warrants now being issued by Lake County on account of said law, all of said bounty warrants so issued shall become a liability against Lake County; therefore, it is ordered by the court that on and after the 30th day of Sept., 1902, the County clerk shall issue no more warrants for coyote or other scalps nor take any such scalps into his possession until an appropriation is made by the legislative assembly for their redemption, provide for by said scalp bounty law, and the court will protect the county clerk against all legal liabilities that may arise from the observance of this order.

The petition of Frank Rogers and

others praying the court to reduce the salary of the Stock Inspector to an amount not exceeding \$50.00 per year, was continued to next regular term of court.

The papers in the matter of the proposed road from the town of Paisley, Lake Co., Oregon, to the boundary line of Klamath Co. being laid before the court, was continued until next regular term.

Whereas: there is a large quantity of legal blanks in the possession of the county, such as wills, mortgages and other blanks which have been purchased and paid for by the county, and whereas: such blanks are not only expensive, but unnecessary in the transaction of county business, and are not required to be kept by law, therefore, it is hereby ordered by the court that the county clerk be and he is hereby instructed to make a careful inventory of all legal blanks now in the possession of the county, and not required by law as necessary to conduct the business of the county, and to ascertain the cost of said blanks, and to sell the same at such cost accounting for the proceeds of such sales in the same manner as for other public monies, and that hereafter no more such blanks shall be purchased by the county.

This matter being heard, upon motion L. F. Conn, attorney for M. C. Currier and G. W. Cooley, for a license to issue to said M. C. Currier and G. W. Cooley and the petition of B. W. Farrow and sixty others having duly filed herein and due and sufficient proof of publication of said petition, and notice of application for a license together with the Co. treasurer's receipt for \$200.00 having heretofore been duly filed herein and their, the said M. C. Currier and G. W. Cooley's bond with Peter Post and Gus Schlagel as sureties, having duly considered the same and finding that petition contains the names of a majority of the legal voters of said precinct and equal in number to a majority of all votes cast in such precinct at the last preceding general election and the court being fully advised in the premises: It is therefore ordered that a license be and the clerk of this court is hereby ordered and directed to issue a license to the said M. C. Currier and G. W. Cooley to sell spirituous, malt, and vinous liquors in quantities less than one gallon, at Paisley, in Chewaucan precinct, Lake County, Ore. for a period of six months from Sept. 9, 1902. No further business appearing the court adjourned for the term.
