Competition is Wanted.

The Prineville country presents the unique spectacle of being a wheat market within itself. Here we are, within 70 miles of a railroad, and equipped with mills for making the best of flour, and from this part of the world not a bushel of wheat or other grain is exported; but on the contrary better prices prevail constantly for grains than on the railroad lines.

We can show you "another county that is its own wheat market which is above the markets of the world!"

Lake County has its mills, its wheat fields, its cent a pound for that cereal, and we import our flour from other counties in order to supply the demand. There is a probability that the area in wheat will increase here next year, because the market for new wheat opened up in Lakeview a few weeks ago at the magnificent figure of a cent and a quarter.

Murder on the Range.

After suffering terribly for weeks without timely or sufficient medical and surgical attendance, a shepherd died the other day away back in the heart of Central Oregon, says the Portland Telegram, in consequence of an attack upon him by a cowardly assassin while he was attending to his employer's flock of sheep.

The killing of sheep in the range country has become a crime of common occurrence, and is itself reprehensible enough; but when blameless and irresponsible herders are shot and killed or wounded and left to suffer and die, it is time that the law get after the perpetrators of these outrages and brought some of them to the bar of justice.

Large bands of sheep ranging in the vicinity of cattle ranges are destructive of pasturage and annoying, and the small "rancher" who is trying to raise a few cattle cannot be reasonably censured for hating the sheep; but under the law, except on certain forest reserves, the sheep and their owners have just as much right to the public range as the cattle and their animals have.

"Private sources" are busy again giving out information about "railroads coming." Thus far "Private Sources" have not proved their assertion though they have been at work for ten years past. However, we are going to take another chance and concur in the opinion of the Alturas Plaindealer, so far as it refers to the "little narrow gauge," when it says: We have received from private sources information that leaves no doubt in our mind that the N. C. O. Ry. will be extended next year.

The distribution of free seed by the Agricultural Department, which will be the largest ever known in the history of the government, was commenced Sept. 21, three months earlier than usual. The Congressional seed distribution is becoming more popular each year, and this year the enormous number of 40,000,000 packages of seed, weighing about a thousand tons, will be given free to the farmers throughout the country.
