Pierce Combs Badly Hurt.

Last Thursday Pierce Combs met with an accident in the vicinity of Honey Creek that came near proving fatal—in fact may yet cause his death. He is very badly injured.

It is not yet definitely known just how the accident occurred, as the victim has not sufficiently recovered to give an account of it, but Mr. Combs was driving his team on the road near Honey Creek and it is presumed one of the lines broke. Mr. Linebarger of Warner, who with Wm. Benefiel came on the scene just after the occurrence, informs The Examiner that a broken part of the line was found lying near the injured man, and the track showed that the team had turned the wagon in a space of about eight feet. Combs was found by the roadside in a pool of blood. Ol. Jacobs and Arthur Price came up about the same time the two other men did, and they lifted the injured man into a spring wagon and Jacobs and Price brought him to town. The team ran into a bunch of willows near by and was caught. Upon reaching Lakeview, a physician was called and found Combs to be in a dangerous condition. The Examiner learns that he is terribly injured about the head and also internally. A few days ago it was discovered that one leg from the hip down was frightfully bruised. It is not yet known how badly the man is hurt, but he is in a precarious condition.

The Nevada, California and Oregon railway company has paid the judgment of A. J. Taylor, amounting to \$16,500. Taylor claimed damages in an accident sustained while he was an engineer on the road.
