

**Turkey Red Wheat.**

Turkey-red wheat, the kind that made Kansas famous, has been introduced into the Walla Walla Valley, and it is hoped by those instrumental in bringing it in that next season will witness a large number of fields producing it, says the Pendleton Tribune. It is a variety that is strongly productive on the lighter land and 90 acres on the farm of Fred Coyle, near Walla Walla, yielded 40 bushels to the acre this year. It is essentially a winter wheat and must be planted in the Fall.

Turkey-red wheat will give a better yield to the acre on the lighter lands than does the bluestem. It is a grain that requires less moisture than bluestem, and for that reason is better adapted to the land upon which it is advocated to be planted. On the soil of lesser density in this county, it will produce 40 bushels where bluestem would only bring 30. That is the claim of those who have tried it, and who claim they know whereof they speak.

While turkey-red is a new wheat in this section, it is by no means an experiment. It has been grown in different parts of the United States for a number of years, and always with excellent results when properly seeded and planted on ground suitable to its needs. It would not yield well on the heavier loam land of the foothills, but on the Eureka flat and Lower Rouchet farms it is claimed to work far better than either club or bluestem.

Turkey-red must be seeded in the Fall and permitted to rest in the soil throughout the Winter, otherwise it will not head. It cannot be sown in the Spring and bring forth a crop.

The stalks will fall to head and die down, to spring up again the next year and produce bountifully. This has been learned from experiments.

**National Park Survey**

The work of surveying the Crater Lake National Park has already begun. The Ashland Tidings referring to the matter says:

J. Frank Warner arrived in Portland, Thursday, from Cheyenne, Wyoming, on his way to Ashland and the Crater Lake National Park, where he goes to survey the boundaries of the new Park, which was recently created by proclamation of the President. Mr. Warner brought part of his help with him and will hire more men when he reaches Klamath Falls. The dimensions of the new park are 12 miles east and west by 15 north and south, the crater being left near the center of the parallelogram. The western portion of the park abuts against the Cascade Forest Reserve, from which it will be separated by a line of government stakes. The work of surveying will probably not be finished until next year.
