

Runaway on the Mountain.

E. B. Ramsey, of Merrill, Klamath county, accompanied by his son, daughter, Mrs. A. E. Martin and Mrs. H. E. Smith, was coming into Ashland yesterday, says the Tidings of last Thursday, over the Ashland-Klamath stage road on their way to Portland, by private conveyance, when they had a serious runaway accident and narrow escape. They were coming down the somewhat steep grade on the Green Spring Mountain four miles east of Wagner Springs, when one of the horses stepped on a large stick lying in the road, which flew up and struck the animal violently. Both horses immediately started to run at a break-neck pace. The surrey was overturned and the occupants tipped out, Mr. Ramsey still holding the reins. He succeeded in maintaining his hold for about one hundred yards, when the animals got away and ran for a distance of over three miles before they were captured. Mr. Ramsey returned to the assistance of the other occupants of the vehicle and found that both ladies were severely bruised and cut up. They were taken to a nearby house and afterwards came to Ashland on the stage. Mr. Ramsey, after securing the horses, succeeded in bringing the surrey to town in a badly damaged condition for repairs. The ladies of the party are able to get around today and will be in shape to continue their journey.

State Superintendent's Report.

State Superintendent J. H. Ackerman has compiled the school statistics of the state from the reports received from the several county superintendents. The statement to be used in the biennial report, shows that the total school population of the state is 138,466, according to the latest school census, of which number 100,756 were on the school registers during the last school year.

The school libraries of the state show a healthy growth, the number of books purchased during the year being 15,821, and the total number now in the libraries is 56,598. The total amount of money available for school purposes was \$2,383,074.43, and the amount expended, \$1,999,809.43, leaving a balance of \$383,265.50.

Saw Captain Jack Hung.

The trip of E. J. Farrow to Crater Lake, says the Ashland Record, was his second trip to that famous piece of scenery, the first trip having occurred 20 years ago. A crowd of Ashland Academy students—Dolph Naylor, C. B. Watson, John Latta, Fritz Mace, and Farrow—secured the late Welborn Beeson of Talent to drive them to Ft. Klamath to witness the hanging of Captain Jack and the other leaders of the Modoc war for the massacre of the peace commission. They drove around and took a look at the mysterious lake which at that time had not been seen by many people and was comparatively unknown except among the residents of Southern Oregon. The poetic features took the eye of C. B. Watson and he wrote and lectured a great deal in the following years upon this magnificent piece of scenic beauty. The San Francisco Chronicle had a great account of the hanging of Capt. Jack and his chiefs and gave a list of "gnosts" including this delegation of Ashland school boys. The Chronicle editorialized upon this by saying it was a meanly shame, and called them white savages and heathens. But the boys didn't mind such remarks in view of what they had witnessed scenically and historically.

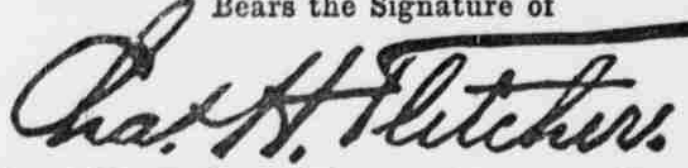

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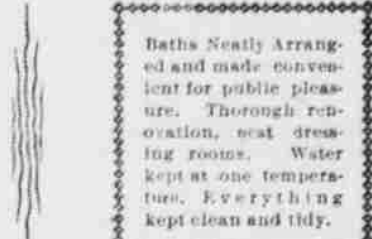
