THE TIMBER GOING.

It is only a few years since the dense forests of Oregon and Washington were looked upon as a detriment. The growth was dense, and the stumps simply appalling to the intending settler. It cost so much to clear the ground that, though the soil was first class, few had either the courage or the money to undertake it. The result was that thousands of acres of the very finest timber in the world was destroyed by fire, says the Portland Journal.

That was the method, the cheap method of getting the ground in condition for the plow. The "burns" soon produced a fine crop of maple and other undergrowth which in turn was burned, and the job of clearing was reduced in magnitude until it didn't break the settler's heart to contemplate it. It would be impossible to make anything like an accurate estimate of the value of the timber thus destroyed, but it would run into the millions of dollars so far that one could hardly be made to believe the figures.

Now all this is changed, and there is a wild scramble for timber lands, and the more timber and the larger the trees the better. Now the land itself cuts no figure, for it is the timber and that alone that is sought.

The Maine forests are gone, those of Michigan and contiguous states rapidly going and now the Northwest must furnish the country, or it must go without Canada has some good forest areas, and so has Alaska, but Oregon and Washington will be denuded before these remote sections are touched.

It takes the timber from 2500 acres to supply the demand in the United States alone for a single day. That is in round numbers, four sections. A strip a mile wide and four miles long, a township every nine days, and in one year a tract six miles wide and 246 miles long. It does not require a very complicated calculation to fix the time when Oregon timber will be only a memory. Against this destruction the Interior Department estimates that 25 acres of forest trees are planted daily, or a tract one mile by 12 in the course of a year. There is, however, some consolation in the fact that owing to our abundant and unhampered rainfall, the young growth starts at once, and in the course of time will replace the forest which the demands of civilization is today destroying.

It appears now that Theodore Roosevelt will be the nominee of the Republican party to succeed himself as President in 1904. The "bosses" cannot drown him; the people are with him. New York has voluntarily promised him its big delegation and enough more states have shown a determination to send their delegations to the National Convention pledged to insure Mr. Roosevelt's nomination or the first ballot. He comes nearest being the ideal chief executive in the opinion of the people than any man who ever held the seat of honor. Roosevelt never looks at the policy side of a question. He takes the "bull by the horns," and acts—without asking "boss" advice.

Once upon a time a man got mad at the editor and stopped his paper. The next week he sold his corn for four cents below the market price.
