

# A THROUGH RAIL ROUTE

Carson, Nev., Paper Tells of the Intended Movement of Railroads Through Lake Co.

In the course of a lengthy article on railroads, in a recent issue of the Carson, (Nevada) News, the editor dwells long on a great transcontinental road, north and south. "It requires only a few connecting links to make a through line from Los Angeles to the Columbia river," says the News. Such a north and south line would naturally keep as near the Sierras as possible to get the mountain traffic. That route has already been laid out and the rails laid for more than six hundred miles.

First the Virginia and Truckee runs south from Reno to Mound House some thirty odd miles.

From Mound House the Carson and Colorado extends three hundred miles to Keeler on the shore of Owens lake. It would require only about a hundred miles more road bed to connect with the roads into Los Angeles.

North of Reno the Nevada-California-Oregon railroad runs one hundred and fifty miles to Madeline plains. It is well known that this line contemplates extending its line on into Oregon by the way of Alturas, Lakeview and Paisley. It will broad gauge the road the whole way from Reno. Its new locomotives have been purchased with the view of making a broad gauge. This road made a contract last fall with the Oregon Potash company to extend its line from Terno to Paisley, Oregon.

From the Columbia river south the Columbia Southern road has built seventy miles of broad gauge to Shilko. The first of this year it incorporated for one million dollars to extend the line a hundred miles further south to Big Bend on the Des Charles river. This would leave a gap of only about fifty miles between Big Bend and Paisley. But the objective point of the Columbia Southern is Lakeview and thus this gap would be closed. With the section south of Keeler filled in this would make a through north and south line from the river to the ocean, more than a thousand miles.

In concluding his article the editor says:

In southern Oregon at Summer and Albert lakes, the Oregon Potash company owns one hundred and seven thousand acres of land. These lakes contain more than twenty million tons of sulphate of potash, which would furnish business for a railroad for more than fifty years.

### Miner is Exonerated

J. Frank Miner, merchant of Klamath Falls, was granted a discharge from bankruptcy by Judge Bellinger in Portland last Friday.

The decision was rendered in passing upon a motion for a rehearing. When Miner went into bankruptcy his wife filed a claim for \$2000 assigned to her by her father, Judge G. W. Smith, of Klamath County. Proof was made against the estate, but the creditors objected, and the claim was disallowed by the referee in bankruptcy. She appealed, and the claim was approved by the court. Miner next made an application for his discharge in bankruptcy, and the creditors again objected, and alleged, among other things, that Miner had committed perjury about 24 times, and asserting that his attitude in favor of the payment of the claim held by his wife, and also a claim held by his brother-in-law, H. E. Smith, for \$500, was a conspiracy to defraud the creditors. Judge Bellinger decided in favor of Miner, and after a rehearing has again found in his favor, which completely exonerates Mr. Miner of all of the charges made against him.

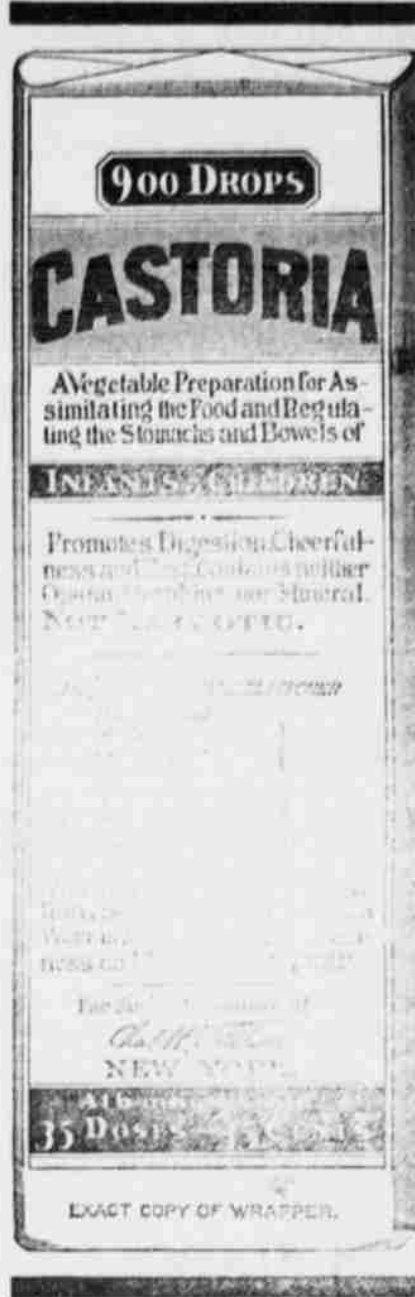
