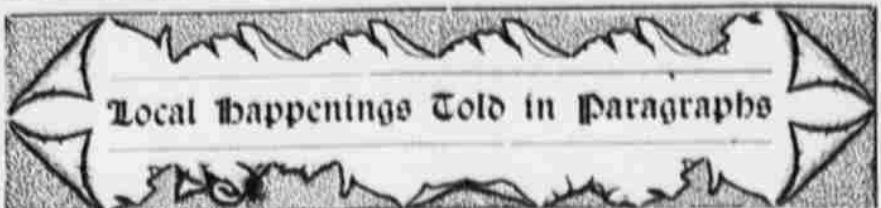
COL. DUTRO'S COLD COMFORT

Dissatisfied With His Conduct of Ashland-Klamath Line the Company "Fires" Him.

The troubles and trials of the mail contractors on the route from Ashland to Klamath Falls are about to cease—until winter and its attending hardships come on. There has been a squabble on for some time between the original contractor and the sub-contractor, and matters have been in a state of chaos until now, so far as the financial part of the contract went.
 The Clinton [Mo.] mail contractors have purchased the wagons and outfit used on the line from W. M. Cockrell, who has turned them over to J. A. McIntire, their agent.
 The Ashland Record says that the company and Col. Dutro are still at odds and as far as the company is concerned, Dutro is out of it and does not collect any more money or do any business for them. It appears that Dutro, who was the successful bidder for the mail route from the government was a resident of Clinton county, Mo., and wished to come west, and they bid in these Jackson and Klamath county contracts in his name. Their bankers at Clinton have a power of attorney from Dutro to collect all his money from the government. These contractors have an understanding with Dutro that he is to receive one-third of the net profits of the line for his share of living on the line and meeting the necessary requirements of the government. The contractors seem to have small faith in Col. Dutro's judgement and business qualifications, as they sent Mr. McIntire to Ashland early in the season to look after their interests and do all the business. This offended Col. Dutro and he turned the contract in to the government. The bondsmen are practically the contractors, and they are running the line. There are several complications yet in the cards and up to the present time the contractors seem to have the best of the deal—or at least think so—in that they hold Dutro where he can not get hold of the revenues of the stage line.

All parties are from Clinton county, Mo., and while they are operating at cross purposes among themselves over possession of the swag the public is not suffering as the line is kept up and conducted with the best kind of speed and efficiency. The timber land rush to Klamath county this summer has made two trips over the entire line for about 600 people, which means a net gain of that much travel since the contract was bid on.
