

REPORT TO WASHINGTON

The Census Office Asks For Reports From All the Farmers on Irrigation Matters.

Inasmuch as experimental work is going on to find artesian water in Lake county, the attention of our people is called to the following special article to The Examiner from the Agriculture Irrigation department of the Government:

The growing demand for water for irrigation purposes emphasizes the need of more detailed information concerning the results and methods of irrigation from artesian and surface waters. The census of 1890 showed that the area irrigated from wells is greatly increasing, and that the results in most sections of the country are eminently satisfactory. Approximately, 186,000 acres were irrigated in that year from wells, the value of the irrigated crops ranging from \$50 to \$100 per acre.

In the humid states well irrigation is utilized to supplement the insufficient rainfall during early spring and summer. In the west the water pumped from wells insures the home garden and the orchard against total failure through a rainless season.

In California, Colorado, Louisiana, Florida, and several other states the waters of flowing artesian wells are successfully applied to large areas, or are used to augment the shortage in the streams during the irrigating season. In order to obtain the important facts relating to irrigation from these sources, the Census office will soon send out inquiries to irrigators from wells, whose names were reported by the enumerators. As this list is not complete, the Director asks that irrigators who do not receive these inquiries will send their names to Mr. L. G. Powers, Chief Statistician, Census office, Washington, D. C., and blanks will be mailed to them at once.

It is requested that all who receive these inquiries answer the same as fully and accurately as possible, and promptly return to the Census office.

State Veterinarian Knowles of Montana says that not one case of anthrax has been known in that state during the past year, but that he had to order 100 horses killed on account of glanders. At that, however, he points out that out of 12,000 horses bought during the season by the British government in Montana only three, or one in 4,000, was found suffering with this fatal disease. The total shipments of horses were \$1,000 head, marketed in St. Paul, Chicago, Sioux City and Omaha. About 1,000 well bred and pure bred breeding horses were shipped into the state.

Doctors Disagree on Bran.
Just at present there is considerable controversy over the feeding of bran to horses, some writers taking the ground that when bran is fed about one-fourth of the entire grain ration it causes colic and inflammation of the bowels. Others claim that bran may safely compose one-half the grain ration without bad effects.

It would seem as if this was one of the questions that each man who keeps horses must decide for himself in the light of results of both plans. In the experience of the writer it has been found that certain horses, predisposed to colic, should not be fed a great deal of bran when oats form the main grain ration, but the quantity may be increased without apparent harm when corn takes the place of oats largely. It is presumed that, with some horses, the combination of oats and bran in the stomach forms a gas which is not present when bran and corn are fed together. With other horses, as stated, it is possible to feed oats and bran or bran and corn in equal quantities without bad results.

Dubbing Us on Shetlands.

American judges of Shetland ponies appear to possess very different opinions upon the points of the breed to those of their British confreres, as it is stated that a famous specimen of the breed was passed unnoticed at a New York show in the class in which her stable companion won upon the grounds that she was too small. Under any circumstances, bearing in mind the fact that this pair of Shetlands have been constantly beating each other at the leading shows of Scotland and England for the past season or two, the fact that one was the winner of first prize while the other got no mention at all must excite some surprise. At the same time, there is consolation for breeders in the reflection that if the bigger Shetlands are wanted in America there will not be very much difficulty in supplying any reasonable demand which may arise, while there will always be a ready sale for the little ones in their native country and England.—London Live Stock Journal.
