**Williamson Doesn't Like Coyotes.**

Hon. J. N. Williamson delivered an address at the Woolgrowers Association meeting at Pendleton recently which was listened to with marked attention by the members present. In part the gentleman said:

"Speaking for myself, it is my desire to go upon record as one who believes the law should be continued, one who believes, that, taking the money out of the pockets of certain of our citizens, and in the transaction destroying the coyote and saving a loss of five times the amount of the money involved in the transaction is a good investment. I want to go on record as in favor of continuing the law for the reason that it is a direct benefit to the home builder—the man from whom much is expected in the way of exploiting the great undeveloped resources of Eastern Oregon. I want to go on record in favor of a continuance of the law, since its feasibility has been established, and since the majority of the expense has been paid. For these and a number of other reasons equally as valid, I do not want to be misunderstood. I am for the continuance of the law.

J. Pierpont Morgan, the great trust magnate, is determined that President Roosevelt shall not succeed himself in 1904, because the President has become hateful to J.
