Inspector Vaile Inspects.

F. W. Vaile, United States postal inspector, was over the route between Ashland and Klamath Falls, last week, to investigate the affairs of that line, and to see what all the row is about between Dutro and McIntire, the rival "bosses" on the same line. Inspector Vaile will probably make a report, also, on the proposed change asked for by the patrons of the line from the railroad east—the change back to Agor for mail service instead of from Ashland. If Inspector Vaile will investigate thoroughly, and not listen to parties on the road who will fill him up with the idea that the Siskiyou Mountain is a plateau where the snow never falls, and that the route from Agor is the worst in the country to travel over, then there is a probability that the change will be ordered, and that the people east of the railroad will have much better service during the winter than is promised over the Ashland route.

Another Big Rush For Timber Locations.

Another swarm of timber land locators have arrived in Ashland, bound for the Sprague River Valley, for which place they will leave by private conveyance, to-morrow, says the Ashland Tidings, Oct. 14.

They are mostly from the state of Iowa. Twenty-five of them arrived yesterday and fifty more—among whom are ten women—joined them this morning, having come from Muscatine in a special car. They are all delighted with what they have already seen of the Pacific Coast and enraptured with the timber resources of Oregon. The livery establishments of this section are now taxed to their utmost to accommodate those who are crossing the divide to Klamath in search of timber land. This Iowa outfit goes over the Ashland-Klamath Falls stage road in about one dozen four-horse teams, and all the vehicles that can be had are being pressed into the service of the timber land seekers.

The filings on these Sprague River lands are all made at Lakeview and the business is adding many thousands of dollars to the revenue of the land office at that place.

A large party left Ashland a few days ago for a new timber land section near Summer Lake, in Lake county, and they will soon be followed by others seeking filings in the same locality.

Another lot of locators reached Jacksonville yesterday and are reported to have gone into the Applegate country to file claims.

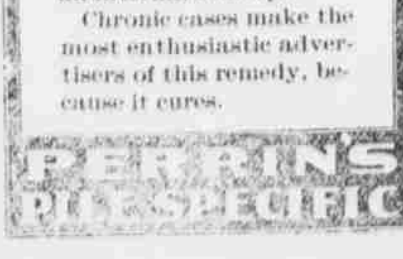
