Hallowe'en Festivities.

Hallowe'en was ushered in last Friday night with the customary pranks of the youngsters (and some "oldsters"), removing gates, overturning wagons and houses, etc. Saturday morning The Examiner office presented the appearance of a great wool depot, some of the gang having placed 300-pound bags against the front entrance. No particular harm was done any place in town and kids and kidders had lots of fun. All Hallow's Even, or Hallowe'en as it is termed is the popular name given to the eve or vigil of all Hallow's or all Saint's Day. In England it was long the custom to crack nuts, duck for apples in a tub of water and perform other harmless fireside revelries, and these customs are largely in vogue in this country, especially on the Atlantic seaboard. Anciently the most essential ceremony seems to have been the lighting of a bonfire by every household. In Scotland the ceremonies partook more of a superstitious character, taking, among rustics, the form of a charm to discover who should be his or her partner for life. Of these the best summary is Robert Burns' well known poem "Hallowe'en."

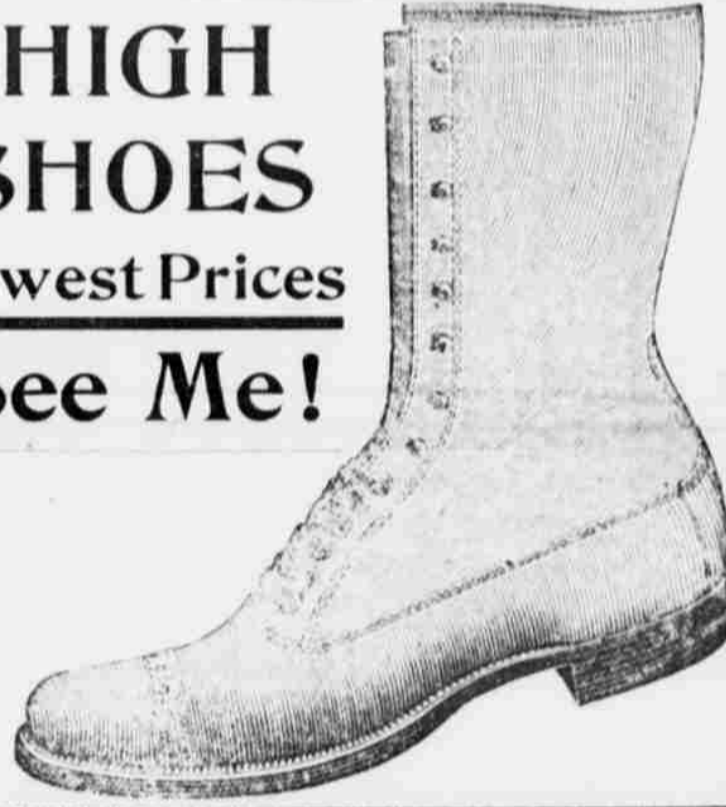
