The horse was caught at the McGrath place. Mrs. Reid was somewhat unconscious at the time and had gone after assistance when Mr. Smith came along. It was not known at that time how much Mrs. Cannon was injured.

Later Mrs. Cannon's skull was fractured and she is in a critical condition.

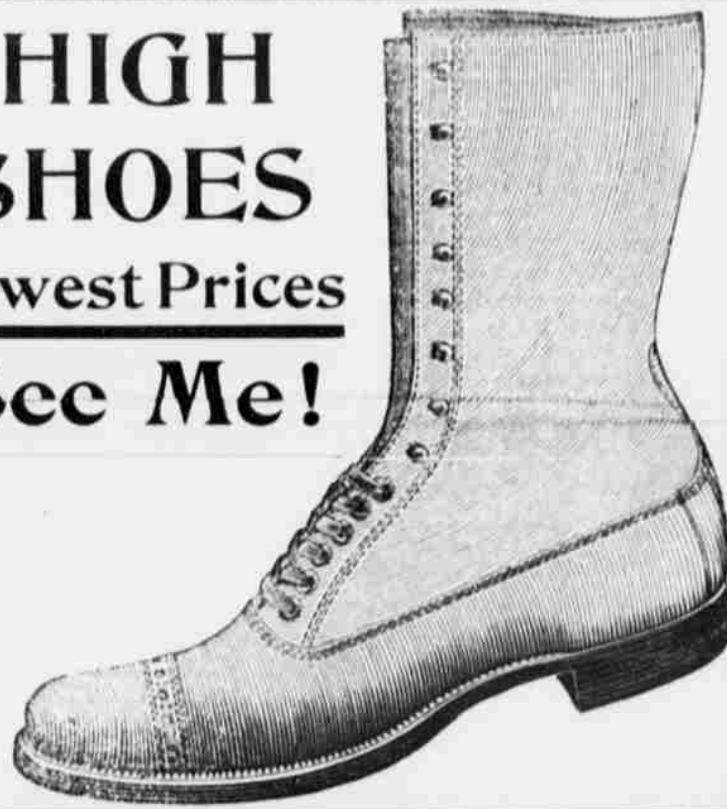
**TIMBER LAND NOTICE**
