An Interesting Letter From Monmouth.

(To the Editor)—I have been thinking that perhaps a letter from the Oregon State Normal school might be of some interest to your readers; it might be acceptable from one of your own town girls, and I will preface it this way:

At the opening exercises of the Monmouth Normal we all assembled in the Chapel room on the second floor to listen to the address of President Bessler which was highly appreciated, and was a new mark for that gentleman's well-known ability. The first initiation into the Normal for a new pupil has many strange initiations—acquaintance, enrollment, getting study cards, and the signatures of the instructors. Buying books and putting our rooms to right was another thing that took up some time.

We have this before us every day: Algebra, by Mr. Robinson, 9 to 9:45 a. m.; physical geography by Mrs. French, 9:45 to 10:30; rhetoric, by Mrs. Pennel, 10:30 to 11:15; drawing, Miss Higgins, 11:15 (adjournment for luncheon) to 2 o'clock; American Literature, Miss Tuttle, 2 to 2:45; Spelling, Mr. Powell, 2:45 to 3:30; vocal music, Miss Higgins, 3:30 to 4:15. Other members of the faculty are Mr. A. F. Campbell, Mr. Forbes, physical trainer; Mr. French, method and principal of the training department; Miss Smith, critic; Mr. Maloney, critic; Mr. Allen, assistant critic, and Mr. J. B. V. Butler, secretary and librarian.

We don't have to do much here—nothing but study all the time, and that isn't work. I have too many studies to make much of a record. I want to get through and finish up, like most of the other pupils here, as soon as possible. We have no time to get into mischief.

The course of study is so arranged that students may enter as graduates of the eighth grade and finish in three years; and in that time complete all the subjects required for a state certificate, eighteen in number with a few additional subjects thrown in, such as history and philosophy of education, drawing, vocal music, two courses in methods, physical training, and manual training. Besides the regular work of the school there are a number of other educational factors in school organized and supported by the students, and with some little assistance from the school authorities and the townspeople. These include athletic clubs, such as gymnastics, handball, basketball, football, tennis, golf, etc.; three literary societies, two for girls and one for boys, A. Y. M. and Y. M. C., and musical organizations. Membership in these student societies is voluntary, but one ought to find time to belong to one or more of them—if he or she would take advantage of the opportunities offered for a well rounded education.

I intended to include in this letter a brief description of the town of Monmouth, a nicely located village between Dallas and Independence, in the heart of the Willamette valley, the coast range of mountains on one side and the snow-pinked Cascades on the other. It is ideal scenery from here.

With these beautiful and inspiring surroundings it is highly fitting that the intellectual and moral tone of the town be good. There are no saloons or gambling houses here, and practically no need of a police department.

I shall write The Examiner again, detailing the town and the workings of the state Normal School. I am simply delighted with my school work here and intend to make the best use of time.
