

**FIGHTS IN CONGRESS**

**MEMORABLE ENCOUNTERS IN THE NATIONAL CAPITOL.**

**Tragic Scene in the Senate When Benton Bared His Breast to Foote's Pistol-Attack on Sumner-Famous Scrimmage in the House.**

Not since ante-bellum days, when bitter debates on the slavery question raised the passions of men to frenzy, has there been until the present time a resort to violence on the floors of congress. The recent physical altercation between the two senators from South Carolina, Tillman and McLaurin, recalls some famous fights of earlier days.

Perhaps the nearest approach to a tragedy in the senate was in 1850, when Senator Benton of Missouri bared his breast to Senator Foote of Mississippi and dared him to shoot.

In 1850 Senator Charles Sumner of Massachusetts, in his debate on the repeal of the Missouri compromise, so incensed the members of congress from South Carolina that one of them, Preston S. Brooks, assaulted Mr. Sumner while he was writing at his desk in the senate chamber. He struck him repeatedly on the head with a gutta serena cane until Mr. Sumner fell unconscious to the floor. Mr. Sumner did not wholly recover from his injuries for several years.

One of the most famous fights in the house of representatives took place in 1809 and nearly led to a duel with bowie knives between Roger A. Pryor of Virginia and John F. Potter of Wisconsin.

The only living survivor of that row who is still a member of congress is Representative Galusha A. Grow of Pennsylvania, who the year following was elected speaker. Mr. Potter was subsequently American consul general at Montreal and died last year at his home, in Wisconsin, highly respected, aged eighty years.

The trouble between Senators Benton and Foote arose out of the ante-bellum debates. Foote had been remorselessly attacking the motives of the northern senators in their policy

blows exchanged Judge Pryor, who has since become a leading lawyer in New York, challenged Patten to a duel. Patten, having learned that Pryor was rated an expert pistol shot, chose bowie knives as the weapons he desired to use in the encounter. However, before the critical moment arrived when the two men would face each other on the field of honor Pryor's seconds threw up the sponge by declaring that they could not consent to let their principal fight with such a barbarous weapon.

toward the south. Senator Foote had the floor, and while he was making some reference to Benton the latter walked excitedly toward him.

Senator Foote started to run away, and Senator Benton increased his speed. As Benton came after him Foote hurried along and drew a five chambered revolver as he ran. Benton was in full chase. He did not see the weapon, but was apparently very anxious to overtake Foote. Senator Dodge of Wisconsin reached Benton and begged him for God's sake to do nothing which would compromise him with the senate. Benton was finally persuaded to turn and retrace his steps. He looked over his shoulder and caught the first sight of the senator from Mississippi with the revolver in his hand. This aroused him to a frenzy of desperation. He broke away from Dodge and rushed back at Foote. Tearing open his waistcoat and his shirt, he bared his breast to the Mississippi senator, who was brandishing the revolver in his hand. He had cocked the weapon as he turned when he saw that he could run no farther.

Benton stood within a few feet of him and with his naked bosom as a target dramatically cried to Foote: "I am not armed. I have no pistol. I disdain to carry firearms. Let him fire. Stand out of the way and let the assassin fire."

The altercation between Congressmen Patten and Pryor occurred over a speech in the house by Owen Lovejoy. Lovejoy's speech was a strong delivery against slavery and led to a scene of excitement in which Patten became involved. He struck Representative Barkadale of Mississippi, knocking him down.
