DEATH OF GRANDMA CHANDLER.

Mrs. Rebecca McKinney Chandler died at her home in Lakeview last Saturday morning, Nov. 15, aged 74 years, 6 months and 12 days. She had not been in good health for some time and the end was not unexpected. The deceased was very well known throughout this country, and was one of those kind hearted old ladies who is beloved by everyone.

Grandma Chandler, as she was familiarly called, was born in Trumbull County, Ohio, May 3d, 1828, and was married to B. S. Chandler, who survives her, Oct. 20th 1851. Eight children were born, six of whom are living. The family came to California over the Isthmus of Panama, in 1866, and made their home near Woodland until 1874, when they came to Lake county, where they have resided ever since.

The surviving children all live in Lakeview but one. They are: Mrs. J. W. Tucker, Mrs. M. E. Kimsey, S. B. Dan, H. L. and James Chandler, the latter lives at La Grande, Oregon. The funeral was held Sunday afternoon at the M. E. Church, and was conducted by Rev. Smythe. The procession followed that of James Snyder to the cemetery.

DEATH OF J. K. SNYDER.

James K. Snyder died at his home at Push, on Friday, November 14, aged 36 years, 11 months and 19 days, after an illness of only a few days. Deceased was taken suddenly ill while out with his sheep, but was not thought to be serious. Dr's Smith and Steiner were sent for and an operation for appendicitis was deemed necessary, which was performed, but the disease had too firmly taken hold and the patient succumbed.

Mr. Snyder was born in Buchanan county, Missouri and came to California in 1881. He removed to Oregon in 1883, and to Lake County in 1887, where he has since resided. He was married to Nancy Burton at Davis Creek in 1888, who survives him. Besides his wife and two children he leaves father and mother, three brothers and two sisters in this County, and one sister in Missouri to mourn his untimely demise.

Mr. Snyder was a member of the A. O. U. W. and W. O. W. Lodges—\$1,000 in the former and \$2,000 in the latter. He was also insured in the Washington Life for \$1,400. Three years ago he went into the sheep business on the shares for five years. There were 3000 head at the time he died.

The funeral was held last Sunday afternoon under the auspices of the A. O. U. W. and W. O. W. Lodges, and the procession to the grave was joined by that of Grandma Chandler. James Snyder was well liked by all who knew him, and left a host of friends to mourn his death.
