On Christmas night it was not sufficiently cold to freeze. Last Saturday and Sunday nights were the coldest we have had this winter—4 and 5 above respectively—no zero weather yet, but close to it. The thermometer did not go down to 8 below zero during all of last winter.

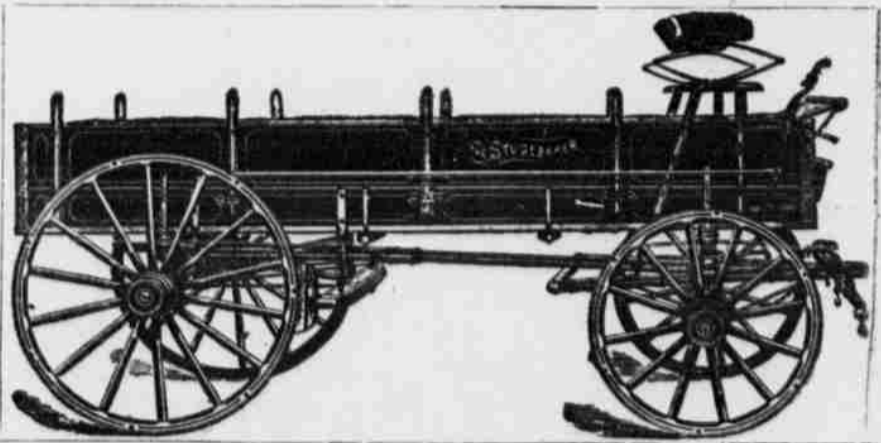
