

LAZY MAN NOT TIRED

Uncle Sam Has Discovered That Laziness is a Disease And is Taking Steps to Cure it.

Dr. Charles Wardell stiles, zoologist of the Department of Agriculture and discoverer of the American hook-worm disease, which he asserts is the cause of the proverbial laziness and backward condition of the poor whites or "crackers" of the South, and also of the conditions which have occasioned the campaign against child labor in the Southern cotton mills, on behalf of the Government took active steps to stamp out the malady a few days ago.

An effort will be made, through the general distribution in the afflicted districts of literature bearing upon the disease, its origin, cause, symptoms, prevention and methods of cure, to educate the physicians in the sand belt to accurately determine the disease and prescribe proper methods of treatment.

As the disease, when once diagnosed and properly treated, is easily susceptible of cure, it is hoped that within a reasonable time the ravages of the hook-worm will be greatly decreased. The disease is seldom primarily fatal. It may run along for years without other than general malarial symptoms, but rendering its victim mentally dull and incapable of sustained physical exertion. There are symptoms of the disease in Lakeview which the Doctors might work on. However, there may be a difference in being born tired and laziness.

CHINESE JOAN OF ARC.

Sieh King King, Who Would Lead Her Sisters Out of Bondage.

A Joan of Arc has arisen to enlighten custom ridden China. Unlike her illustrious prototype, she leads no armed hosts, and the banner she raises is for the reform of social conditions, not the glory of a king. Nevertheless the pagan maiden's patriotism is as heroic and her purpose as noble as that which actuated the Maid of Orleans.

Under the auspices of the Chinese reform movement Sieh King King, an eighteen-year-old Chinese girl, has been leading a crusade among her countrymen and women in San Francisco against the system which keeps the Chinese woman ignorant and makes her a slave.

Sieh King King is the daughter of a liberal-minded Tientsin merchant and first lifted her voice in public when she addressed her countrymen in the public garden at Shanghai when it became known that the late Li Hung Chang proposed by a secret treaty to place Manchuria under Russian control.

She came to this country for a university education, but in addition to her studies intends to wage vigorous warfare for the freedom of Chinese women. Chinese women of the better

class never mingle with men either at private or public gatherings. Little Sieh King King proposes to change this and put them on terms of social equality.

The lack of education and self confidence, Sieh King says, makes the Chinese woman difficult to handle. She has no trouble in convincing the men, but centuries of subjection and captivity have made the women timid.

The young reformer does not believe in the Chinese practice of crippling women by stunting the natural growth of their feet and will fight for the abolition of this barbarism as well as the other reforms she has inaugurated. Sieh King King lives with her uncle, Hsueh Sing Ying, a San Francisco merchant. She has the support of the best Chinese element in this country in her proposed reforms.

UTAH'S NEW SENATOR.

Mormon Apostle Who May Sit in Upper House of Congress.

As a result of the recent elections an apostle of the Mormon church will probably succeed J. L. Rawlins as United States senator from Utah. The election of Reed Smoot by the legislature of Utah is practically assured, and the opponents of Mormonism are preparing to make a fight against his recognition by the members of the so called upper house of congress.

The campaign in Utah was a most spirited one. Smoot's candidacy was warmly supported by the adherents of

the church in the state, while many of the gentiles were opposed to the idea of electing a Mormon apostle. At any rate, he won out handsomely and is sure of election if he allows his name to go before the legislature. The legislature meets on Jan. 5. Reed Smoot is an apostle of the Mor-

mon church, is but little over forty years of age and is wealthy and popular. His father was one of the pioneers who crossed the plains with Brigham Young and was an early settler of Provo, Mr. Smoot's present home. His wife is a daughter of H. S. Eldredge, a leading banker of Salt Lake City. She brought him a fortune, which he has increased by careful handling until he himself is reputed to be a millionaire. He is a banker and manufacturer and is interested in a large number of other enterprises.
