

**DEAD CHIEF  
"FIVE CROWS"**

**Who Succeeded in Capturing Old Egan Chief of the Bannock Indians--Lake Co. Resident**

Five Crows (Paha-cro-lo), one of the most noted Umatilla Indians has passed from this earth into the happy hunting grounds.

Whisky was the cause. Sunday Five Crows was happy and well. He left his wigwam on the reservation and started astride his pony for Athena, where he began to fill up on fire-water. In the evening he started home and Monday morning his body was found lying in the road at the Hank Vaughn place, a few miles from Athena.

Five Crows' pony was standing tied to a fence post near the body, which was lying stretched out in the middle of the road. It is supposed that he was too drunk to know what he was doing and that he got off his horse, tied it to the fence, laid down and froze to death, as the night was very chilly.

Five Crows was in the neighborhood of 70 years of age. He was well known and distinguished because of the part he played in the Bannock war of 1878. It was he who killed Egan, the famous Bannock chief, who was responsible for the uprising of the Bannocks.

In 1878 the little handful of settlers who were living in this country were expecting every day to be swooped down upon by the Bannocks and scalped.

Five Crows was a young man and a true friend of the whites. His father, Five Crows, was the chief of the Cayuse Indians.

Egan was recognized as the one responsible and it was thought that could be outwitted and slain or captured the backbone of the uprising would be broken. Egan was a wily old chief, however, and kept himself in the background, where it was impossible to capture or kill him without strategy.

He was camped with his band of warriors in the mountains south of here and was planning a raid on the handful of whites then camped at the agency.

Umagine, another friend of the white settlers, went to the general in command of a little soldier band at the agency and said that he could prevent the proposed raid. Accordingly he went to the bloodthirsty Egan and told him that he had come to talk over a profitable alliance with the Umatilla Indians in the proposed massacre of the whites.

This pleased Egan and he gave Umagine a prominent position in his army.

Umagine then began to plan to kidnap Egan and sent word to the soldiers at the agency to be stationed at a certain place ready to swoop down upon the wily chief when the word was given. Fearing treachery on the part of Umagine the soldiers refused to go, and Umagine sent for a number of Umatillas, among them being Five Crows. Umagine told Chief Egan that his friends wished to join in the killing of the whites and they were admitted to Egan's tent. At a signal from Umagine the warriors pounced upon Egan, bound him hand and foot and started to carry him away. In some manner the wily chief got his hands unfastened and was going to kill Umagine, when Five Crows detected what he was intending to do and stabbed him to death.

To convince the whites that the Umatillas meant to be true to them and that they had accomplished their purpose, Egan's head was severed from the body, placed on the end of a pole and carried to the agency, where it was laid at the feet of the commanding officers.

This was a gruesome trophy, but the sight of it brought relief to the handful of soldiers and white settlers cuddled at the agency barracks, as they knew that in the death of Egan the Bannock war had been ended.

Chief Five Crows, father of the slayer of Egan, was one of the leaders in the Whitman massacre. He was a peculiar character and always longed for a white wife. When the men were all killed in the Whitman massacre he selected a

white woman and carried her away with him. Her name was Miss Bewley, and she was taken to the chief's home on the Snake River, where she was treated royally until ransomed by the members of the Hudson Bay Company. Several members of his company were sent to the chief's home with a boatload of blankets and trinkets. After a great deal of talk and bargaining it was agreed that for \$500 and a large amount of goods of different kinds the chief would give up Miss Bewley, but he is said to have shed tears at the parting.
