Studley & Harris being the lowest bidder was awarded the contract and agree to furnish to the order of the County Judge of said County one casket made of common pine lumber and trimmed, ranging in size from five to six feet three inches for \$15, and smaller sizes \$10, and to take corpse to the grave for \$5, and in case of delay in having to care for corpse at \$2.50 per night.

If corpse is more than 5 miles from town to remove same for 20 cents per mile or five dollars per day.

In the matter of appointment of county physician:

The court having opened and examined the bids of the several physicians find as follows, to-wit:

That Dr. E. H. Smith has filed the lowest and best bid, to-wit:

To furnish professional services, medicines, wines, liquors and such other stimulents as may be required; to attend all coroner's inquests and examination of insane and to attend all paupers within the distance of twenty miles of Lakeview, at the rate of \$24 per month.

Also to attend such paupers over the distance of twenty miles from Lakeview, as the court or any member thereof may deem necessary, at the rate of forty-five cents per mile.

It is ordered by the court that the clerk purchase stamps for all the county officers.

Court adjourned until Wednesday Jan. 28th 1903.
