**Artesian Well Bill
Of Great Benefit.**

A bill for an Act entitled an Act to encourage the sinking of artesian wells in Eastern Oregon. Be it enacted by the Legislative Assembly of Oregon; and, also, be it enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:

Section 1. The county judges of the several Eastern Oregon counties of Wasco, Sherman, Baker, Umatilla, Morrow, Gilliam, Crook, Grant, Harney, Malheur, Lake, Klamath, Union, Wallowa, and Wheeler, are hereby constituted a commission with full powers to carry into effect this Act as hereinafter provided.

Section 2. Each county named above shall pay to the commission aforesaid, upon demand, out of the general fund of the county, an amount not to exceed \$1,000; the State Treasurer shall likewise pay a like amount: Provided, however, that payment shall not be made except upon proper proof that an equal amount has already been paid into the artesian well fund by the counties.

Section 3. It shall be the duty of the commission to cause to be drilled one well in each of the aforesaid counties.

Section 4. The county court of the respective counties shall select the location of the proposed well: Provided, however, that said location shall be made in the voting precinct that contributes the largest amount of money to the sinking of the well so located: And, provided further, that the minimum amount of such contribution be \$1,000.

Section 5. After expending all the money as provided for in sections 2 and 4 in sinking any given well, the commission may, if they think it advisable, continue sinking the well: Provided, additional means are subscribed for that purpose.

Section 6. Drilling of the wells shall be let in one contract to such person or persons as shall submit the lowest bid by the foot: Provided, however, that no bid shall be accepted without the filing of a good and sufficient bond.

Section 7. The artesian well fund is only applicable to the payment of contract well drilling by the foot, upon the completion of any given well, except that \$500, or so much thereof as may be necessary, may be used in way of advertising for bids and to cover expenses of the commission; such expense to be charged pro rata against the several wells.

Section 8. Inasmuch as it is desirable to have the well test made as soon as possible, this act shall take effect and be in force from and after its approval by the Governor.


