A bill raising the salary of the president to a hundred thousand dollars has been introduced in congress, but there is no danger that he will strike if it fails to pass.

A bill providing for all hangings at the state penitentiary has passed the senate, and it is to be hoped will get safely through the house. Having been recommended by the governor it will be promptly signed.

To force non-resident owners of Oregon timber lands to pay their just taxes on such lands is the object of a bill by Representative Johnson. Its title is as follows: "A bill for an act to require the Assessors of various counties of Oregon to procure from the local land office or the general land office at Washington and from the state land office, lists of all titled timber lands in their respective counties, and to classify such lands at their actual value according to the quantity of timber thereon, and to assess the same at its actual value; and requiring County Courts of the several counties to pay for such lists."

When the cold snap struck this vicinity last week The Examiner man was kept quite warm during the day running to the phone answering queries from numerous people as to how cold it was the night previous. Oregon now ranks first in the number of Angora goats and in the quality of the mohair produced is a successful rival to that of Turkey, says the Medford Success. Goats thrive on land when other stock would starve, and being hardy and very free from disease they have advantages that commend them to farmers in this section. There are now a few bands of goats in the Rogue river valley and they have been so profitable that it is now certain that their numbers will be increased and that goat raising will become one of the leading industries of Oregon.

A Reapportionment Bill.

Reapportionment of the amounts annually contributed by counties for maintenance of state government is proposed in Senate Bill No. 162, introduced by Senator Pierce of Umatilla County. Provision is made for preparation annually of a statement of probable expenses of the state, together with the deficiency totals. Of the whole the counties will pay proportionate parts as follows:

The bill of Senator Pierce is intended to continue the present rate of state levies upon counties for a period of five years from 1905, when it expires. The only material changes are in Baker County where the percentage is raised from .0195, as at present, to .0235, and in Union County, where there is a reduction from .0262 to .0222. The rate is based on county assessments for the past five years.
