

Some Are Too Short Sighted.

The Lewis and Clarke Exposition should and will be the means of bringing many a welcome citizen to Oregon if properly advertised, says A. W. Cheney in the Portland Journal. And a large appropriation should be set aside for advertising the Fair and the State of Oregon. It is impossible to have an exhibition with the money at hand that will outrival or come anywhere near the St. Louis Fair, and the managers of the Lewis and Clarke Fair should not try it, but they can, by judicious management, make one dollar go as far as two in an enterprise of the magnitude of the St. Louis affair, where there is abundant room for grafters to get in their work. If the Legislative bill giving each county an option on spending \$1,000 for advertising purposes should pass it should be made mandatory for counties to spend that amount. If each county would receive as a result of such advertising 10 new citizens who would invest in farms they would be amply repaid but many are so short sighted that they can see no good in advertising. The different localities could thus help the Fair materially by putting forth the argument that 1905 would be a good time to visit their section and also see the Fair. Would Los Angeles amount to half as much but for the never-ending stream of advertising that it receives from newspapers, pamphlets, railroads and other sources. San Diego, which is situated better in many ways and has better summer climate, has not received the advertising that Los Angeles has and hence does not advance nearly as fast. It is estimated that over 3,000 buildings were erected in Los Angeles last year, while I doubt if a hundred were put up in San Diego. The main object of the Fair should be to get people from the East to visit Oregon and the Coast and see for themselves the endless resources of this part of the United States. All railroads should follow the excellent plans adopted by the O. R. & N. and begin to get the Eastern people's eyes upon the Coast long enough ahead to let the intending visitors prepare for the trip. With reasonably low railroad rates and liberal advertising the Fair will be a success.

The purpose of these officers in banding together is to promote a better acquaintance among the Sheriffs of the state and by a full consideration of mutual interests advance the administration of laws in the apprehending and returning of offenders to their respective sections. Sheriff W. A. Storey, of Multnomah, was made president of the organization, and Sheriff B. B. Colbath, of Union county, was named for secretary. The Sheriffs' Association will meet in Salem next September during the session of the State Fair, although the president is authorized to call a meeting at any time the interests of the members may require.
