Governor Chamberlain should not have vetoed the bill allowing money in the hands of officials or officials' salaries to be garnished. Any bill which has for its object a method to make a man pay his just debts is a good measure.

A senate bill to pay ex-Queen Lili of the Hawaiian Islands \$200,000 was reported unfavorably. She asked for a million. The two hundred thousand will permit her to live comfortably; at any rate she is in great luck. It has not been many generations back since deposed monarchs were decapitated.

The homestead law will be extended to include Alaska. As there is no doubt about there being a vast amount of land in that country which will produce rye, wheat, potatoes and nearly all vegetables in use, it would be a good time to settle it up with the starving Finns and Swedes. One hundred and sixty acres to each head of a family is an inducement.

A large two column picture of District Attorney A. E. Reames adorns the first page of the Oregonian of the 19th. The Oregonian says: "It is generally believed that Mr. Reames will be the Democratic nominee for Congress to succeed the late Representative Tongue. He is a son-in-law of Mr. Tongue, and lives at Jacksonville, and is one of the most popular men in Southern Oregon."

Among the bills that passed both houses of the Oregon legislature is one that provides that each keeper of a stockyard must compile and retain always subject to public pursuit, a complete list of all registered brands or markings of livestock in his district or immediate vicinity. It is held that if this is carried out it will discourage thieves who will fear to take stolen cattle to places where they are almost certain of detection.

In the last twelve months American quarter-blood wools advanced in price a little over 14 per cent, while the average advance abroad on similar wool was 46 per cent. The minimum foreign advance being 27 per cent and the maximum over 82 per cent. The world's supply of wool has decreased in consequence of the great falling off in the product of Australia, whereas a succession of years of terrible drought has destroyed the flocks and obliterated the wool business.—Oregonian.

Dispatches of the 16th of this month state that a blizzard of unprecedented severity is sweeping over the country, the same story of snow and extreme cold coming from all directions. Dispatches show the limits of the storm to be Nevada in the West, the Atlantic ocean in the East, the Great Lakes in the North, Texas and Georgia in the South. Here in Lake County on that date and during the week previous, the weather was clear, calm and cool, without a storm cloud in sight. No finer winter weather could be wished for than we had at that time.

Stelwer's reappointment bill, by which the "shoestring" counties of Eastern Oregon, now grouped as Wasco, Sherman, Gilliam, Grant and Wheeler, and Wasco, Klamath, Lake and Crook, will be cut loose, caused a little tilt in the House last Friday afternoon. The committee on irri-

gation presented both a majority and minority report. The majority report recommended that the bill not pass, while the minority recommended the passage of the bill. And despite the protests of the Wasco County people, the minority report was accepted by the House, which is looked upon as indicating that the reapportionment will be carried out. Burgess, Wheelton and Judd, of Marion, presented the majority report to down the bill, while Emmitt and Gunn were the men who handed in the minority report. When the reports were read by the clerk, Emmitt moved to adopt the minority report, and the Eastern Oregon Representatives were all attention, while the remainder of the House drew out of the map into which it had settled. If the bill passes, it puts Wasco in one Representative district with two Representatives and Sherman, Gilliam and Wheeler in another and Klamath Lake Crook and Grant in a third district, each with two Representatives.

Forest Ranges.
On February 12th the House amended and passed Senator Booth's bill to protect timber lands and forests from fires. The measure passed the Senate January 31. The bill creates a Board of Fire Commissioners of five members—L. J. Simpson, R. A. Booth, S. Benson, R. A. Emmett, and C. W. Nibley. Each is to represent a specified district. This commission is to "have control and charge of all matters pertaining to the protection of forests and timber." This commission is to name at least one fire warden in each county, who in turn they are to appoint rangers, subject to the approval of the commission. These rangers are to be appointed at the request of timber interests and to be paid by those interests. The rangers are to have police powers to enforce the act. Locomotives and engines must have spark catchers between June 15 and October 15 of each year.
