Silver Lake on the Eve of a Big Boom.

Silver Lake, Oregon, Feb. 20, 1903. ED. LAKEVIEW EXAMINER:

For the last week I have heard that the little town of Silver Lake was crowded with strangers and that it was impossible to get accommodations for all. I had also heard that a newspaper would be published next week by a stranger whose name is Bailey. To day I went up to town, and I found the half had not been told. Twenty-six men and one woman, all strangers, are here locating timber land. To day, Creed Conn introduced two men to me, one by the name of Baldwin, the other I have forgotten. They are also going to start another newspaper as soon as they can get a building erected. Think of it: two newspapers in this one time considered out of the way place, and the extreme settlement in northern Lake county. And you might say almost surrounded by a desert country. They tell us that there will be four hundred emigrants looking for homes and locations on the desert, and that Silver Lake will be the centralized point of Lake county. A man was hired to haul out a load of hay to the McCarthy ranch about 12 miles from town, and he was given twenty dollars per ton.

There is undoubtedly a "tiger in the woodpile," and these parties are on a hot track. There is lots of room for homes on the Silver Lake desert. I did not travel over three hundred miles this summer not to see them. In many places, water will be found near the surface.

Will say there is considerable excitement among the present population. My name might be "Sear Face Charlie," but it ain't. I guess I won't change my name for a while, but will under the old non de plume.
