The President on recommendation of Representative Moody has nominated M. T. Nolan for Register and Annie M. Lang for Receiver of The Dalles Land Office, to succeed J. P. Lucas and Otis Patterson, whose terms expired last July. Neither of the appointees were applicants for the office.

The committee appointed to investigate the books and affairs of the state land department reported that L. B. Geer, retiring state land agent, has not complied with the law in the selection of the lands in sections 16 and 36 and estimates that the state has lost, on this account, about \$800,000. The books are reported to have been accurately kept.

Among the republicans prominently mentioned for Congress in this district are: Hons. L. T. Harris, Geo. C. Brownell, Binger Hermann, Claude Gatch, H. H. Hewitt, T. T. Geer. The democrats also have a number of aspirants in the following: A. E. Reames, R. A. Miller, M. A. Miller, J. K. Weatherford, Bernard Daly, W. I. Vawter, O. P. Coshow, J. K. Townsend, P. H. Darcy, Jeff Myers, Robert Smith.

A bill has been introduced in the Minnesota legislature declaring that it shall be unlawful for one person to kiss another unless he can prove he is free from contagious or infectious diseases. The bill states that the certificate of a physician declaring a person to have a weak heart, shall constitute a bar to kissing and violation of the bill is accounted a misdemeanor and is punishable by a fine of from \$1 to \$5 for each offense.

Irate timber land locators are looking for Thomas Strader, a timber cruiser of Douglas County. It is alleged that he has located two sets of people on the same claims, located 35 miles east of Roseburg. Last fall a party from the East located the claims in question, built their cabins and returned home. One day last week they again visited their claims, and found that many of them had been jumped by newcomers during their absence. Strader is the man said to be responsible for this state of affairs.

Governor Chamberlain vetoed one of the three general appropriation bills passed at the recent Legislative session. Among the items affected by this sweeping veto is the \$14,500 appropriated for an executive mansion; \$34,000 for scalp bounty payments; \$10,000 for the improvement of the state fair grounds; \$1000 for payment of Tracy and Merrill claims, and a number of private claims. The total amount is something over \$62,000. A constitutional provision makes it mandatory that in vetoing any single item of appropriation all items embraced in the bill must go with the veto.

The Reno Gazette says: George H. Bayley of Modoc county has the only big bunch of cattle being fed this side of the mountains. He is still feeding 1400 head of beef steers in Honey Lake Valley, and on the Truckee Meadows. There are only about 11,000 head now being fed in this inter-mountain region, including Honey Lake Valley, Truckee Meadows, the Big Meadows at Lovelock, the Carson Sink and in Mason Valley, Lyon county. G. W. Mapes sold on Saturday 500 fat steers to Hayson of Los Angeles and has left but about one hundred head of cows for the shambles. The 500 sold Saturday, it is understood brought eight and a quarter cents. They were a fine lot of cattle and tipped the scale at 1200 pounds on an average.

Young Corbett and Eddie Hanlon fought 20 fierce rounds to a draw at San Francisco on Thursday night. Both showed skill, science and endurance, and the fight is declared one of the best ever seen on the Coast. Hanlon had the advantage during the first seven rounds, but Corbett showed great recuperative power, and kept the game about even, though he seemed several times on the point of being knocked out.
