### An Act of Humanity.

Humane acts toward dumb animals are not unknown in this country, but the practice of humanity is not so much in evidence in the West as in the East. The attention of The Examiner has been attracted the past few weeks to the perambulation of two old crow-baits of horses, which go from one place to another in search of a morsel of hay to eat to keep life and body together. Every old scrap will be picked up, and every time a load of hay would go through town they would be observed, following along as fast as their wobbly legs would carry them, and would grab a mouthful now and then.

They have become so poor since the snow has been on the ground that words of pity were heard from many people, and words of condemnation for the owner who would allow his horse to run at large in the winter time, but very few people thought of feeding them. The Examiner has also observed, that two or three out of the many, who are humanely inclined, have for a week or more, been throwing out now and then a forkful of hay, so that the starving horses might live until grass could be found on the hillsides. Humane acts of this kind are deserving of hearty commendation by everyone, and should be a lesson to those who might come in contact with a similar case.

Few people know that there are societies for the prevention of cruelty to animals, but such is the case. The words on the seal of the American Humane Education Society is: "Glory to God, Peace on Earth, Kindness, Justice and Mercy to every living Creature."
