**Eugene The Place.**

The Republican Congressional committee, representing the 17 counties comprised in the First Congressional District of Oregon, met at the Imperial Hotel in Portland last Thursday and took action as follows relative to the selection of a Congressman to succeed the late Thomas H. Tongue: Nominations will be made in regular form, by primaries and a general convention to be held at Eugene on Thursday April 9. There shall be 173 delegates chosen to the general convention, the basis of representation being that of the vote at the last Congressional election. County conventions to be held not later than April 4. The representation will be as follows: Benton 7, Clackamas 17, Coos 8, Curry 3, Douglas 4, Jackson 12, Josephine 7, Klamath 4, Lake 4, Lane 19, Lincoln 4, Marion 22, Linn 13, Polk 9, Tillamook 5, Washington 14, Yamhill 11. Total, 173.

Representative Jones, of Lincoln, who gallantly championed the cause of Binger Hermann in the Senatorial fight, was at the meeting, and he thinks the late land commissioner has a very good show for the nomination for congress. There is no doubt but what Mr. Hermann is the most popular man in this part of the district, and should be nominated he would receive a larger vote than any other candidate.

**Oregonians Make Big Winning.**

One of the biggest clean-ups of the entire racing season was made at the Oakland track on March 16th. The "killing" came off in the fifth race, when Forest King galloped home a winner. He had been backed heavily in every book in the ring. The opening price against this horse was 50 to 1, but he was regarded as such a good thing by his stable connections that they were prepared to accept a much shorter price. The tip was general and the price was cut to 30, 20 and then gradually down to 10 to 1. The "bookies" took more money than is customary on a long shot, as Forest King less than a week ago ran absolutely last.

There was nothing to the race but Forest King. He soon took the lead away from David S. and won with great ease by a length.

It is estimated that \$30,000 was taken out of the ring on this race. It was a veritable field day for Oregonians and Northern people, as every one from the Webfoot State seemed to know that Forest King was going to win, and the fact that Dil Fountain was betting on the horse made numerous betters follow him. Forest King is an Oregon-bred horse, being by Handsome, son of Hanover. He is owned by S. J. Jones, who ran Misty Morn at the old Bay District tract.

Bookmakers did not take their medicine with much grace, and there was an indignation meeting after the races, at which the judges were roasted for allowing such reversals of form without taking action.

Oregon will own one half of the taxable property of the whole State, and perhaps will have nearly one half of the population.

I opposed the repeal of the scalp bounty law with all the zeal and determination I could command. So much so that I was commonly dubbed "Coyote" Emmitt. But the facts are, it was traded, exchanged and delivered for the Portage Railway on the Columbia river, which was to benefit Portland. Kay of Marion who said the people of Eastern Oregon made a business of raising "Scotch terrier" dogs for the purpose of marketing the scalps, was reminded that the people of Eastern Oregon were equally as honest in their vocations as other people on the Pacific coast. He was also reminded, by referring to the record which shows a decrease of coyote scalps in Marion county, and that by reason of his own zealous opposition to the law, it might be supposed that "Scotch terrier" farming did not pay in Marion county. He was the same individual who introduced and caused the passage of a bill appropriating \$14,500 to purchase a residence for the Governor of Oregon, which he openly said he did not want. Whether Mr. Kay received a commission for the sale of this property, or whether it was solely in Marion county, or both, would be difficult to determine, but he did it, and I feel congratulated to know that the Governor had the good sense to veto the measure.

The Portland Board of trade assumed to dictate to certain members from Eastern Oregon how to vote on certain irrigation measures. The idea of a resident of the Willamette valley assuming a knowledge of irrigation.

They are in error from the beginning upon the assumption that land requiring irrigation is unfit for agricultural purposes, and the further they proceed the more erroneous are their conclusions. When we ask for a few thousand to bore a limited number of experimental artesian wells, and proposed to furnish three fifths of the expense ourselves, then they suddenly remembered that they are expending too much of the people's money and express sympathy for the poor taxpayer. I mean these same individuals who bought a residence for the Governor.

I am glad that Portland did not get the U. S. Senator, and I will guarantee that the people of Oregon will never regret the election of Mr. Fulton.


