Blank forms for claims for services rendered in the Oregon Indian wars of 1855-1856 will be furnished claimants upon application therefor to the Adjutant-General, Portland Oregon. A copy of the act of the 22d Legislative Assembly, 1903, authorizing the payment of claims for their guidance and information. Claims must be prepared and presented on the prescribed blanks—which blanks will be found to sufficiently indicate the facts which should be stated.

Mrs. F. P. Light came near bleeding to death last Sunday afternoon by accidentally severing an artery in her left hand. Mrs. Light was trying to dig some home made candy from a plate with a pair of scissors, when they suddenly slipped and pierced the palm of her hand. The blood flowed freely and before a physician could be procured she fainted away. The Southern Oregon State normal School no doubt feels quite proud of its good fortune in receiving so generous an appropriation as it did at the last legislative session. The sum of \$186.36 was received by the school as a maintenance fund, and \$8000 was given for the purpose of putting up an additional building, to supply the requirement of the growing school. Under the management of Pres. B. F. Mulkey, the school has made material advancement, and its enviable reputation in spreading every year. Students from Lake county are well pleased with the way it is conducted.

For the information of any voters who may not be advised in the matter, it can be stated that legal voters are not required to register again for the coming special congressional election in this district in June says the Tidings. The law provides for the registration of voters only for general elections once in two years. For the coming special election to choose a successor to the late Congressman Tongue, the last registration is still in force and those who have since become legal voters may exercise that right upon the affidavit of six freeholders as provided by registration blank "A".

St. Patrick's day was observed by a large number of Lakeview people. The day was quite springlike and green ribbons decorated many coat lapels. The first appearance in public of the new Lakeview brass band was made on the street about 5 o'clock in the afternoon. The fact that most of the boys never had a horn to their lips two months ago, they did exceedingly well, and their music was thoroughly appreciated by the large crowd of people who gathered on the streets. The ball in the evening was well attended, and everyone seemed to enjoy themselves until 4 in the morning.

Strickland returned from Ager last Sunday mounted on a beautiful bay horse which had been shipped from the Haggin Rancho Del Paso, Cal., and will be added to the fine collection of horses now at the ZX ranch in Chewaucan valley, this county. Briar Hill is royally bred, and has a record as a winner of numerous races in California. His sire was imported from England. As Lake county already has a reputation for raising race horses that have made world's records, this addition is expected to do much toward making the county famous as a producer of blooded horses.
