Some sheepmen came to town last Saturday with three small burros that attracted considerable attention. The animals were loaded down with packs filled with supplies that would put a freight wagon to shame.

Dan Malloy returned Tuesday from a visit to his sheep camp in the Warner country. Dan reports only a natural loss which was to be expected. Other sheepmen in that section report a very small loss, which is contrary to the first report.

M. Dalie and Chas Blanding of Portland, have been here several days looking over the plats at the land office with a view of placing script on some Lake county timber lands. The lands to be taken will be in the neighborhood of Summer Lake.

Owing to the bad condition of the road between Ashland and Klamath Falls, stages have been delayed to the latter place, which caused the stage to miss connection with the Lakeview stage, consequently we have missed getting our mail several times lately.

L. N. Kelsey editor of the Central Oregonian, one of the new papers at Silver Lake, came down to the county seat Tuesday and returned this morning. Mr. Kelsey says there is a great future for the northern Lake county. He is also favorably impressed with Lakeview.

B. S. Chandler has rented his place in Lakeview, and last Monday started for his boyhood home at Allwell, Ohio, where he will visit relatives and old friends and will remain indefinitely. Mr. Chandler has been quite feeble for some time and he thinks the change will benefit him.

A. J. Bennett, solicitor and traveling correspondent under the pseudonym of "The Old Observer," for the American Shepherd's Bulletin, of Boston, was in Lakeview several days this week. Mr. Bennett will write up the sheep industry of Lake county for his magazine. He has been interesting the sheepmen in a plan to sell their wool clip to the Associated Wool Grower's Company of Boston.

The suit of Bessie Messner against J. M. Messner for a divorce, the custody of their two children and part of their homestead, which was tried at the last term of Circuit court, and was taken under advisement, was granted by Judge Benson in chambers at Klamath Falls. Mrs. Messner was given the custody of the children and one-third of the land. C. H. Dalrymple represented the plaintiff and W. J. Moore and Spencer & Eaker the defendant.

Strikers Won Their Case.

The report of the Anthracite Strike Commission was filed with the President on the 18th and decides every point for the miners. It was unanimous. It gives the miners a 10 per cent increase in wages, provides for weighing coal and for check weighmen to represent the miners. The eight hour system is to be established. Future disputes are to be settled by committees of the parties directly concerned—an indirect recognition of the union.

Democratic Convention.

The Democratic Congressional Central Committee met in Portland on the 18th and selected Albany as the place for the congressional convention for their first district and the date will be April 11. They will nominate a candidate to run for Congressman to fill the vacancy now existing, caused by the death of Thos. H. Tongue. This will give the Democrats two chances at this office during the term and they have just as good a chance to win as they had before. Delegates to the convention may be elected by primaries or appointed by county committees at the option of these committees.
