

**RIVAL MILLIONAIRES.**

**What Mr. Carnegie and Mr. Frick Are Doing For Pittsburgh.**

The good citizens of Pittsburgh rejoice and profit in the rivalry of two multimillionaires. Henry C. Frick and Andrew Carnegie seem to be trying to outdo each other in the magnificence of their gifts to the limiting city.

That they are rivals both men deny, Mr. Frick clinching his statement with the remark that there can be no rivalry since Mr. Carnegie is worth five dollars to his one. Frick is a rich man, of course, but his \$50,000,000 or so compared with the wealth of Carnegie seem hardly worth mentioning. His estimate of Carnegie's five dollars to his one is probably correct.

But, according to all accounts, Mr. Frick has entered the lists against Mr. Carnegie in Pittsburgh. He has already

built a skyscraper that overtops the Carnegie building by five or six stories. He is about to put up a hotel, the biggest and finest in Pittsburgh and almost as big and fine as the biggest and finest anywhere else.

But, besides this, the news has gone forth that across the street from the famous Carnegie Institute Mr. Frick will build a university. The Carnegie Institute comprises a music hall, a library, a museum and an art gallery.

This is all very fine, but Mr. Carnegie stipulated that the city of Pittsburgh must maintain the institution. Not so with Mr. Frick. He has signified his intention not merely of paying for the buildings and giving the land, but he will set aside an endowment fund of \$2,500,000 for the support of the university.

**A Good Move if True.**

A Lakeview correspondent of the Portland Telegram in a communication dated March 24 says:

"A head tax of 2 cents has been levied on sheep, and the resultant fund will be employed to counteract the effect of the repeal of the scalp bounty law. The tax, it is estimated, in this county will make a sum of about \$6000. This sum will equip and put in the field ten good hunters, who will patrol the range, destroying coyotes and incidentally assist sheepmen wherever they can render assistance. It is thought these men under proper direction and properly selected will destroy more 'varmints' than were destroyed under the bounty plan, and at no additional cost to range men. Cattle-rabbers approve the repeal of the bounty law, but the sheepmen feel chagrined."

This information is new to a great majority of the people of Lake County, and it is not known in Lakeview who is at the head of the movement, if there is or has been any such action taken by any one. Up to the present time The Examiner has not learned from where this report started.
