Her family and friends are rejoicing at her restoration to complete health.

The band will furnish the music and the proceeds will be divided equally between the ball games, the band and the Agricultural Association, they furnishing the grounds and the grand stand.

During the heavy wind last week, the ice on Goose Lake was broken up and driven on the shores on the north end of the lake. The ice is pretty thick and was piled up in immense masses. It is reported that one iceberg was thrown up fully as high as Hotel Lakeview. The roar and noise when the lake is breaking up is terrific.

Last Friday afternoon ten students in Prof. Willits' room and three in Miss Sands' room played "hookey" and spent the afternoon upon the hill above town. L. D. Gupton arrived last week from the P ranch where he has been working the past winter breaking horses. This ranch, which is located over the line in Harney county, is the largest ranch in the state of Oregon. Mr. Gupton says that hay has run short on the ranch and that cattle are extremely poor. Other ranches in that section are reported to be in a similar condition. Mr. Gupton noticed that cattle in Warner and other sections of Lake county that he came through, were comparatively fat and had apparently wintered well.

Fred Fletcher, driver of the Lakeview-Plush stage, had great difficulty in coming through Camas Prairie last Thursday. The snow there is quite deep yet, and the recent warm weather had softened it so much that his horses and cart went through. With the assistance of three men, he improvised a platform from boards taken from a ranch house, and together with a canvas, the horses were driven through the valley. The horses would first be driven upon the platform. From there they were led onto the canvas, and then upon the platform drawn around in front, and visa versa, until they had traveled over the worst of the road, a distance of 1 1/2 miles. The time required in going this distance was fourteen hours, and the stage came in fourteen hours late Friday morning.

Big Race Meeting.
