Dan Maloy went over to look at his summer sheep range near the Klamath County line and returned Monday. He found the range in good shape, but the mountain between here and the range is covered with frozen snow. He expects to start his sheep over the snow this week.

Ed Armstrong, the brick contractor who built Hotel Lakeview and several other buildings in Lakeview, returned last Thursday from Burton, where he has resided for the past two years. He is here to figure on putting up a large brick hotel for W. K. Barry, to replace the wooden structure that burned last fall. The contract has not yet been let. Mr. Armstrong has other brick structures to figure on, among them a large store for V. Conn, the Paisley merchant.

Lake county weather occasionally gets on a tantrum, just to show people what it can do, and that it hasn't forgot how it is done. When certain ones begin to feel as though spring was surely here, and that it was impossible to have any more winter, then the weather clerk thinks it is the proper time to cool off their fervid brain and fertile imagination. The fore part of last week was as nice spring weather as one could wish for; farmers were plowing, gardeners were at work, people were cleaning out their back yards, and the smell of burning rubbish permeated the air. All this was changed in the twink of an eye by the weather clerk, who on Friday night, opened up the snow throttle, and before he could close it again, dropped 5 inches of snow on the bosom of mother earth in the vicinity of Lakeview. Other sections fared worse even than Lakeview; in Warner there was 10 inches, and at Willow Ranch about as much. For a freak the weather clerk for Lake county is entitled to a gold medal at the hands of the Lewis and Clark Fair board.

Dr. Steiner and Mrs. Steiner started last Sunday morning for their old home at Salem for a months stay. Their two daughters Rita and Barbara have been stopping with their grand parents this winter and going to school. The Dr. was compelled to go away on account of his health, and will probably spend a month on the coast. He has not recovered from being blood poisoned last fall, which was caused by an accident while attending a patient. It is hoped Dr. Steiner will return completely recovered. The family expect to be gone a month.

Leslie Russell was the victim of a very painful accident last Saturday while branding calves on the 70 ranch in this valley. In throwing a rope on a calf his thumb caught between the rope and the saddle horn and that member was torn completely off at the first joint, making a very ugly looking and painful wound. It was quite a coincidence from the fact that the accident happened just 8 years and one day after a similar accident at the same place, in a like manner and the same thumb; only the thumb was not completely severed, but was patched up and did good service for eight years.

The Klamath Falls papers report that Fred and Clara Biehn had a narrow escape while crossing the Lost river bridge on April 5th. The boys were on a load of hay and when about midstream the centre span dropped into the river with horses, wagon, hay and boys. Everything landed rightside up and the horses were cut loose and swam ashore. The boys and wagon floated down stream a few hundred yards, where they walked out on the backs of the Mirade of suckers that had kept pace with the load of hay like a band of town cows. It is reported that the alfalfa hay only lasted a few minutes, and the suckers stuck their snouts out of the water and whistled for more. Some one at our left hand who is authority on the habits of suckers, says that when they get a taste of alfalfa once nothing will stop them from going out into the fields and mowing it down to suit themselves, but prefer to eat it out of the stack.

Once in a while one or more people are suddenly struck with the idea that they want a certain piece of land, and the more they think about it the harder they are struck. The stage that morning brought another filing on the same piece of land, by another Merrill citizen, who made haste to reach Klamath Falls to file before a U. S. Commissioner, but there is where he made his mistake.
