The capital stock, \$50,000, has been subscribed, and either a brick or stone structure will be erected this summer. A site for the bank building has been selected and only the signing of the papers remains to be done. A portion of the stock was subscribed in the county, the balance being outside capital. This will not only be a great convenience in a commercial and business point of view but will add materially to the importance of our town.
