Ager are 170 miles, and Shaniko, on the Columbia Southern, 262 miles. It can readily be seen that home-seekers find a suitable stopping-place long before they reach Lake County.

It is estimated that not more than 100 people have found homes in this county during the past year. Most of the people who have come into the county are looking for timber land, and they only stay long enough to file on the land and come again when they prove up. Over 500 timber-land claims have been filed on in the past year, and out of that number only about 150 have proved up on their land. Not over 25 homesteads have been taken up the past year, and most of these by people who are already residents of the county. The census of 1900 gave Lake County a population of only 2800, which was claimed by people who were in a position to know that it was several hundred short of the actual number. The school census would indicate that to be the fact. The average increase in the school census since 1900 has been 45. Last year there were 1922 school children in the county. The census to be taken next June is expected to make an increase of at least 50 children.

The fact that the nearest railroad to Lake County, or rather Lakeview, the county seat, is 100 miles, and this road in California, greatly retards the emigration now coming to Oregon, a proportion of which would come here were the facilities for reaching here better. The advertising that has been done has but little effect owing solely to the lack of railroad connection with the metropolis of Oregon. No county in the state can offer greater advantages for the stockraiser than Lake. However, the stockmen who already own land and control the ranges are not disposed to let the outside world know anything about their good fortune, consequently immigration to Lake has not been excited. It is expected the coming Summer, after the roads become passable, that more people will find their way to Lake County than ever before, and the coming of a railroad in a year or two will cause the county to be settled up as it should be.

JULY RACES

The Lake County Agricultural Association will give four days racing on their track in Lakeview, commencing July 2d, and ending July 7th, 1903. The sum of \$1400 will be distributed in purses as follows:

3d Race	Vaquero race for Lake County horses, to be rode with vaquero saddles and Spanish bit bridles and to be rode by vaqueros. Distance 600 yds. \$75
THIRD DAY - JULY 6th.	
1st Race	1/2 mile heats \$200
2d Race	3/4 mile dash \$150
FOURTH DAY - JULY 7th.	
1st Race	\$200
2d Race	one mile \$2.00

NOTE.—1st race on 4th day, race and distance to be made up on the track, July 3d.

CONDITIONS.
All of the above races are free for all except the saddle race, which is for Lake county horses. Four to enter and three to start in all races, but the Association reserves the right to hold a less number than four by reducing the purse in proportion to the number of horses entered. Entries to close the evening before the race. The Pacific Coast Blood Horse Association rules to govern all running races. Entrance fee ten per cent of purse. Money to be divided as follows: 70 per cent to the first horse and 30 per cent to second horse. The Association reserves the right to change any of the above races, in the event of not filling, or to change the date of the last day's event to the following day in case any other amusement is announced for that date. No money paid without a contest. Entries for the saddle race to be made before a committee composed of Jim Green, Harry Roberts, Jeff Parish, Chas. Trumbo and Willard Duncan.
