In speaking of the recent Republican Convention the Ashland Tribune says: The nomination of Binger Hermann for Congress by the Republicans of the First District was to be expected by those who understand the purpose of a majority of the politicians instrumental in effecting it. Hermann is more distinctly representative of the dominant Republican faction in Oregon than any man who contested with him for the nomination. His followers were loyal and aggressive and the convention proceedings show that they had not the least notion of abandoning him for a new leader. A few of the delegates before the convention met and credited with threatening a revolt on election day if their man was defeated. Hermann's personal acquaintances in the district exceed that of any other man who was up for the place. His work with the departments at Washington for many of his constituents during his former long service in the House is well remembered by them, and they belong to all parties.

The Spokesman Review of Spokane, Wash., in commenting in the nomination of Mr. Hermann, says in part editorially: Binger Hermann's nomination for congress from the First district of Oregon, to fill the vacancy occasioned by the death of Thomas H. Tongue practically means hielection. The district gave Tongue over 3000 plurality in 1900 and over 7000 plurality in 1902, so there can be little doubt of the success of the republican candidate. Mr. Herman will make a creditable representative. He is not brilliant, but he is experienced and hard working. He is acquainted with the needs of the northwest, and his previous long service will enable him to take a position of influence from the day of his return to the house.

The Oregonian says: A. E. Reames, of Jackson County, the Democratic nominee for Representative in Congress for the First District, is a young man of good ability and good character. He will poll the entire vote of his party, but hardly anything more. The necessity of supporting and vindicating the Roosevelt Administration is understood; and Mr. Hermann therefore should be sent back to Washington.

One of the features of the great military parade at the World's, Fair St. Louis, on Dedication Day, April 30, will be the battery of mountain artillery whose guns are carried in four sections on the backs of as many Missouri mules.

Modoc county will give an annual fair beginning Oct. 5th and continuing six days, whether the state gives any financial aid or not. The Alturas Jockey Club also expects to have a race meeting the coming June or July.

A book of 441 pages on laughter has been written by the English psychologist, Prof. James Sully. He dwells much on the physical benefits derived from open hearty laughter.

Salem is to fire the first gun in the campaign of Mr. Hermann, and Mr. Gatch, his chief opponent in the Eugene convention, is to do the priming.—Stamman.

**Additional Local**

A. H. Mulkey's school closed last Friday and he left the following day to begin a three month's term, seven miles from Lakeview. Mrs. Mulkey intends to open a millinery and dressmaking parlor in the Post Office building at Lakeview.—New Era.

Millions of butterflies are eaten every year by the Australian aborigines. The insects congregate in vast quantities on the rocks of the Bugong mountains, and the natives secure them by kindling fires of damp wood and thus suffocating them. Then they are gathered in baskets, baked, sifted to remove the wings, and finally pressed into cakes.

A number of tests made by the Vermont experiment station found that arsenite of soda and the arsenic-soda mixture are very satisfactory for killing weeds along walks and drives. These can be kept perfectly free of weeds by the use of these mixtures.

The Point Richmond Daily Record says: Yesterday afternoon a carrier pigeon came to the home of L. G. Beach in this city. The bird appeared to be very weary as if from a long flight and is now engaged in recuperating his strength. It is very tame, but as yet has not submitted to being handled. On one of its legs is a small circlet of metal, bearing a number or initial letters.

What is said to be the largest and heaviest anchor ever made was recently forged at the Charlestown (Mass.) navy yard. It weighs over eight tons and cost nearly \$2,000. It is 15 feet long over all and 9 feet 6 inches wide over the points. The palms are 32 inches wide. The cable for this anchor is unique also, as regards weight, each link weighing 60 pounds. Three hundred and sixty fathoms (2,160 feet) of it are to be supplied.

**Hitchcock Backs Down.**

It has become necessary already for Secretary Hitchcock to modify his charge of "wholesale fraud" in Oregon timber lands, and smooth it down to the milder title of "use and benefit". Elsewhere we publish an interview by the Oregonian's own correspondent in Washington, where Hitchcock admits that nothing has yet been discovered in all the investigation made to point in any way to fraud. His main object was to get Hermann out of the way. Hitchcock is a great friend of the railroads, and believes in allowing them to locate thousands of acres of the most valuable of timber land with worthless scrip, shutting out bona fide settlers. This is the rankest injustice yet perpetrated upon the people, one that Hermann did not endorse and because he did not stand in was not needed in the general land office. The time is coming when "murder will out."—Eugene Register.
