

Sign the Petition.

A petition is being sent to each of the Postmasters in Lake county, asking that all residents of the county sign the same. The petition reads as follows:

"To the Hon. Commissioner of the General Land Office, Washington, D. C.

Dear Sir: On March 26, 1903, the Hon. Secretary of the Interior reversing your office decision in the case of J. L. Morrow, et al vs the State of Oregon, and the Warner Valley Stock Co., want instructions to prepare and submit for approval a new swamp list embracing all the lands in controversy.

In view of the fact that this decision will practically evict about forty families from their homes on these lands, where they have resided for nearly twenty years, we the undersigned citizens of Lake county, Or., respectfully petition that you hold in abeyance the preparations of said swamp land list, until the settlers can have an opportunity to exhaust such legal remedies as may exist; and your petitioners in duty bound will ever pray."

The above petition ought to be signed by every liberty loving citizen in Lake county. Not that the Warner Valley citizens want anything that they are not justly entitled to, but to give them a fair and square hearing, which they claim they have not received in the last decision.
